THREE MEN ARE ACCUSED OF OWNING HUGE STILL

Complaints Filed Against Hart Bros. and Broom TWO ARE IN COUNTY JAIL

Third Has Not Yet Been Apprehended Although Warrant Has Been Out Long Time

John and Albert Hart, who were arrested Wednesday and Mark Broom, who is not yet in custody, all living near Hendricks bridge Sunday, April 23, by Sheriff Stickle and his deputies. The still which had been in the vault at the sheriff's office just a month has been destroyed.

Ever since the still was seized District Attorney Johnston and the sheriff and his deputies have been working on the case. They obtained evidence that convinced them that the Hart brothers and Broom were the operators of the plant, said to have been the largest seized anywhere in the Northwest for a long time, and as a result the Hart boys were arrested on memorial day but Broom could not be found. A warrant has been out for his arrest ever since the raid on the mountain still was made but he has thus far eluded the officers. While District Attorney Johnston and the sheriff's deputies were in that locality Wednesday they searched Broom's house and found a quart of moonshine and a big automatic revolver which they brought to Eugene with them.

Broom is said to have been in Eugene that day, having driven down in company with his wife but she returned home alone, according to the officers. The father of the Hart brothers was not locked up in jail, as stated, as he is not accused.

The grand jury will convene again today and these cases together with one or two others will be taken up. A final report will be made to Judge Skipworth Saturday.
