OREGON TRACK TEAM TO COMPETE AT PULLMAN

Last Appearance of Locals Will Be June 1 and 2

Oregon's track team will make its last appearance this season tomorrow afternoon at Pullman, on the occasion of the annual Pacific Coast and Northwest conference meet. The record established by the Oregon track squad this far this season has not been impressive with both of the meets, with the Oregon Aggies and the University of Washington, having been dropped, but it is likely that the Oregon squad will make a strong showing in the conference meet as entering colleges are allowed only 12 men teams and as Oregon's strength will be packed in the 12-man team to beat the Lemon Yellow at Pullman.

Ralph Spearow will bear the brunt of the Oregon attack and should garner a good many points against the field for the Webfoot. If Spearow is right, the records in the pole vault for conference meets, now held by Eldon Jesse, of Washington State, Pacific Coast, 13 feet 5 1/2 inches, and North-west, 13 feet one inch, seem doomed to be shattered. In any event, Spearow should cop first place in the vault, as he has been doing 13 feet one and 34-100 of an inch against the Aggies. Spearow will enter both the jumps, the broad and the high, and he is counted upon for places in both events. His ability to do 22 feet and over in the broad jump should win him some points, although Boren and Muller, of California, are apt to beat him, as they are doing well over 22 feet this year. In the sprint, Oregon should take some points against the field. Spearow and Farnsworth, of the Bruin entries, are 10-second men, and both Larson and Oberthur have done the century under that mark. Larson, running his last race for Oregon, will have an excellent chance to cop first, although Hurley of Washington will give him some trouble.

In the two-mile run, Koepf has thus far fallen way down from his last year's performance and against Washington and the Aggies placed third, but if Koepf shows his last year's form, he should place first or second, as he has turned in faster time than any of the contestants, with the possible exception of Doerr of California.

Oregon's track squad of 11 men accompanied by Coach Bill Hayward, Graduate Manager Jack Benefield, Track Manager John Palmer and Rubber Pat Layton left Eugene yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Pullman. The squad will arrive at Washington State college at 11 o'clock this morning and will engage in the preliminary races and tryouts this afternoon with the main events scheduled for tomorrow afternoon. Oregon will enter Larson, Oberthur and Lucas in the sprints, Riley, Harndenburg and Roush in the 440-yard dash, Peltier in the half mile, Koepf in the two mile, Spearow in the pole vault and the jumps, Bowles in the broad jump and Kamps in the decathlon.

FOOTBALL TRAINING ENDS

LIVELY GAME MARKS LAST DAY OF WORKOUTS

The spring football season culminated yesterday afternoon with a game between two opposing squads, the well-styled Gophers and the Piffers. The Piffers won by a 7-0 score, although they were outplayed by the Gophers, captained by Max Sax throughout the majority of the game. The Piffers won early in the game when Jean Du Paul, half back, grabbed a fumble and raced 50 yards through a broken field for the game's first touchdown. The game yesterday afternoon was the culmination of a long grind of spring workouts that started April 15 and that have been held nightly since the first of May. As a result of the spring training and the talent it has unearthed and developed it is evident

that there will be no dearth of material when first call for fall practice sounds September 15.

Two man teams will represent the opposing schools, Bill Swindells and George Monaghan playing for Oregon.

Morris, of the firm of Bakus and Morris, sporting goods house of Portland, was the city's yearling cowboy, going with Eugene's sportmen concerning the shoot. Beavey has the shoot clinched, in the opinion of Morris, who is a strong believer in the ability of the Eugene gunners to bring home the championship. A delegation from this city is also expected to make the Corvallis trip Sunday to take part in the final day's shooting.

The annual Northwest championship will be held at Portland in July according to Morris, who expects that several upper valley entries will participate in the competition.

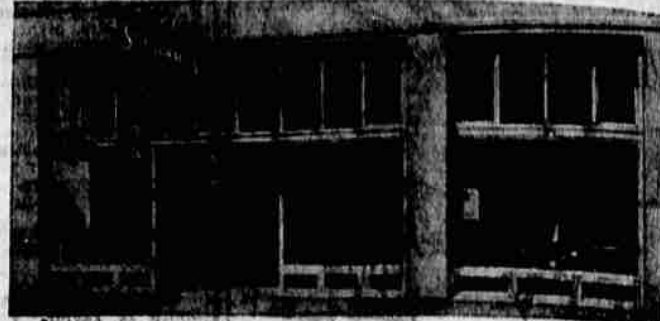
RIBBLEY, GORMAN, DRAW
