FORGER UNDER ARREST

G. G. SPURGEON CHARGED
WITH PASSING BAD CHECK
Charged With Using Name of Ore-
gon Western Lumber Com-
pany and Manager

G. G. Spurgeon, of this city, will be
brought back from Portland
today to answer the charge of for-
gery. He was arrested in Portland
late Wednesday night on a war-
rant issued here and placed in the
hands of Sheriff Fred G. Stickle,
who communicated with the offi-
cers in Portland that night.

Spurgeon on Wednesday gave a
check for \$20 at the Rainbow
grill in payment for a meal and
received his change. The check was
signed, "Oregon Western
Lumber Company, by E. V. Phil-
lips." Mr. Phillips is the manager
of the company which operates a
lumber brokerage office in the
First National bank building.

Herman Burgoyne, proprietor
of the Rainbow, saw the check
soon after it was passed and called
up Mr. Phillips to ascertain whether
or not it was genuine. Mr.
Phillips said it was a forgery and
the officers were notified.

In the meantime Spurgeon hired
the U. of O. jitney company to
take him to Portland in one of its
cars and when he dismissed the
driver in that city gave him an
order on the Oregon Western
Lumber company for his fare.

Deputy Sheriff Van Svarverud
left last night for Portland to
bring Spurgeon back to Eugene
and the case will probably come
up before the grand jury today.

ONE CANNOT BE FOUND
Six Empaneled to Serve Refuse

FOREST IS INSPECTED

COLONEL GREESLEY HERE TO
VISIT CASCADE TRACTS

Chief of the Forest Department of
the United States Here With
Party of Officials

On an inspection trip to the
timber tract near Oakridge, of the
Cascade national forest which is
soon to be sold to the highest bid-
der, Colonel William B. Greeley,
chief of the United States forest
department, is here being accom-
panied by a party of officials of the
department. The tract of 685,000,000
feet was recently advertised for
sale and the bids are to be opened
the latter part of this month. Ac-
companying the chief forester on
the trip to Oakridge yesterday
were E. E. Carter, assistant fore-
ster, in charge of timber sales, E.
E. Amee, of Portland, assistant
district forester, and N. E. Mad-
daff, supervisor of the Cascade na-
tional forest.

Colonel Greeley and Mr. Carter
will spend the next few weeks in-
specting the various government
timber holdings of Oregon. The
chief forester voices the opinion
that the Oregon forests are at the
threshold of a great development
period owing to the supply of
available timber in other sections
of the United States being rapidly
depleted. The program of cut-
ting in the national provides for
the reforestation of the tracts and
this plan will assure a permanent
supply of timber for the future,
according to Colonel Greeley.

MAN INJURED BY MOTOR

J. W. THORNSBERRY STRUCK
AS HE CROSSES STREET

J. W. Thornsberry, resident of
Patterson Island, is at the Eugene
hospital following an automobile
accident early in the evening in
which he sustained injuries to his
head and severe lacerations on the
face. Mr. Thornsberry was struck
by a car driven by G. W. Whitley,
140 Seventh avenue east. The ac-
cident occurred at the intersection
of Sixth avenue and Willamette
street, about 7:30 P. M., and wit-
nesses report that Mr. Thorns-
berry stepped out from the curb
at the curb, making the turn
and evidently did not see the ma-

chine, stepped into the car and was
struck by the rear fender.
He was taken to the hospital by
Whitley. His injuries, although
painful, are reported to be not
serious. Mr. Thornsberry lives
with his cousins at Patterson
Island, and has been in the hop-
business in Lane county for the
past 25 years.

WALTER M. PIERCE TO SPEAK
AT DAIRY MEETING

Governor Walter M. Pierce will
be in Eugene today to speak at
the chamber of commerce, start-
ing at 2:45 o'clock at the quarterly
session of the Oregon state dairy
council. A large attendance is ex-
pected for the meeting today, ac-
cording to M. M. Boney, in charge
of the arrangements for the event,
as about 800 invitations have been
sent out to dairy men and others
interested in the industry in this
vicinity and at other points in the
state, he reports.

At the noon luncheon to be held
at the chamber of commerce today
talks will be given by State Sena-
tors Fred Flak and J. S. Magrader,
J. D. Mickel, of Portland, secre-
tary of the Oregon dairy council,
is also scheduled to speak. H. E.
Paville, chairman of the agricul-
tural committee of the Portland
chamber of commerce, will speak
at the afternoon meeting prior to
the address of the governor.

raid by the officers and being the
largest ever seized in Lane county

iff decided to make a cleaning out
and aside from destroying this still
he emptied 18 gallons of moon-
shine into the sink in his office.
