OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—All ex-
press and freight deliveries were
canceled for the day, but some nearby
arrivals of strawberries were shown
Wednesday. There was a shipping de-
mand for stuff with sales of better class
berries as high as \$2, while some or-
dinary stuff sold down to \$1.50 a crate.
Because of the payment of 7c a pound
by the canners, which with the cost of
a crate added would mean \$1.20 a
crate, the trade here is not inclined to
believe that berries will not sell much.
If any lower, except during a temporary
overflow of supplies.
There was practically no local trad-
ing on front street Wednesday be-
cause of the holiday. While most of the firms
were open until 11 A. M., city trade
was practically suspended. On the East Side
Farmers' market there was likewise
an absence of trading for the day, although
several growers forgot about the holiday
and appeared.

EGG TRADE UNDERSTONE QUIET

Latest activities in the egg market in-
dicate a generally easier undertone. Ef-
forts to force sales with the South have
failed during the last day or so. Some
of the a. b. buyers are talking of pay-
ing as much for eggs as they can be
sold at.

VEAL TREND IS ABOUT STEADY

Sales in the country-killed calf mar-
ket were just about steady at the clos-
ing of the trade Tuesday evening. Trans-
actions were up to an extreme of 14c
for tops, although most of the good offer-
ings did not move above 13 1/2c. Hogs
on nominal basis.

BUTTER SITUATION IS STEADY

Situation in the butter trade con-
tinues to indicate steadiness. Were it
not for the Tuesday rise at San Fran-
cisco, values for cubes would have eased
off here, according to leaders of the
trade.

OLD ONIONS ARE SELLING WELL

Old crop Oregon onions are selling
well at \$2.25 to \$2.50 per cental to re-
tailers. Demand for old Oregon is far
better than for new California reds. In
fact, the local stock is of superior keep-
ing quality.

CRANBERRY DAMAGE REPORTED

Damage to the cranberry crop of the
Oregon-Washington coast as a result of
the frost of a week ago is confirmed,
although it will not be known for some
time what the loss will be. Some of the
