MUSIC COURSES OFFERED

REGULAR AND SPECIAL WORK
AT SUMMER SESSION

Classes at University Will Be Held
In Eugene From June 27 to
August 4

Regular and special courses in
music will be offered in the Uni-
versity of Oregon summer sessions
at Eugene and Portland. The Eu-
gene session is from June 27 to
August 4, and the Portland ses-
sion from June 25 to August 3.

Mrs. Anne Landis Beck, pro-
fessor of public school music, will
give beginning and advanced
courses in public school methods,
as well as a course in history and
appreciation of music, at the Eu-
gene session. Piano pedagogy, a
course in piano teaching methods,
is scheduled at Eugene with
George P. Hopkins, assistant pro-
fessor of piano, as instructor. Pro-
fessor Hopkins will also give
courses in elementary harmony
and piano playing.

A course in high school orches-
tration is available for music stu-
dents who desire practical and
concentrated training in directing,
organization and orchestration.
Opportunities are offered in the
Eugene session for those who want
private instruction in piano, voice,
violin or organ.

William H. Boyer, supervisor of
music in the Portland public
schools and Frederick W. Good-
rich, instructor of music in the
University of Portland Center, will
have charge of music courses at
the Portland session. Mr. Boyer
will offer courses in school music,
advanced music and choral direct-
ing. Mr. Goodrich's courses are
history and appreciation of music
and fundamentals of music. Organ
recitals will be given at the Mu-
nicipal auditorium by Mr. Good-
rich during the summer session.

LUMBER SALES LOWER NEW BUSINESS 17 PERCENT BELOW PRODUCTION

One hundred and thirty mills re-
porting to West Coast Lumber-
men's association for the week
ending May 26, manufactured
109,187,190 feet of lumber; sold
90,688,381 feet, and shipped 102,
244,104 feet, says the regular
report of the association.

Production for reporting mills
was 23 per cent above normal. New
business was 17 per cent below
production. Shipments were 23
per cent above new business.

Thirty-six per cent of all new
business taken during the week
was for future water delivery.
This amounted to 32,308,215 feet,
of which 25,579,215 feet was for
domestic cargo delivery, and 6,
629,000 feet export. New business
by rail amounted to 1743 cars.

Thirty-one per cent of the
week's lumber shipments moved
by water. This amounted to 31,
413,938 feet, of which 25,397,045
feet moved coastwise and inter-
coastal, and 6,016,893 feet over-
seas. Rail shipments totaled 2158
cars.

Local auto and team deliveries
totaled 6,090,166 feet.
Unfilled domestic cargo orders
total 172,047,513 feet. Unfilled ex-
port orders, 93,798,741 feet. Un-
filled rail trade orders, 7811 cars.

In the first twenty-one weeks
of the year, production reported
to West Coast Lumbermen's as-
sociation has been 2,043,377,957 feet;
new business, 2,210,934,671 feet,
and shipments, 2,281,854,807 feet.

PSYCHOLOGIST IS COMING DR. JOHNSON, OF ST. PAUL, AT SUMMER SCHOOL

Dr. O. J. Johnson, assistant di-
rector of the bureau of educational
research of St. Paul, will be on the
university campus during the sum-
mer session and will give courses

IN EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOLOGY AND IN INTELLIGENCE TESTS, AND WILL CONDUCT RESEARCH IN EDUCATIONAL PSYCHOL- OGY.

Dr. Johnson has been directing
various tests for mental alertness
and efficiency among the school
children of St. Paul, where the
system has been developed to such
an extent that special classes are
held for exceptional pupils. He
has written an article entitled
"Non-Verbal Group Intelligence
Tests for Primary Pupils," which
appeared recently in the Journal
of Applied Psychology, and is the
author of "Teachers' Judgments of
Qualities of Gifted Pupils as Re-
lated to Classroom Activities,"
which will soon be published in
School and Society.

In 1918 Dr. Johnson was gradu-
ated from the School of Military
Psychology at Camp Dodge. Here
he was occupied exclusively in the
individual examining of recruits.
He received his doctor's degree
from the University of Minnesota.

INCOME TAX IS UPHELD

GOVERNOR URGES SUPPORT
OF OLEOMARGARINE BILL

Burden of Taxation Must Be
Shifted from Soil, Says W. M.
Pierce at Dairy Council

Strong support of the oleomar-
garine measure and the income tax
bill both of which are facing a
referendum at the coming election
was voiced yesterday by Governor
Walter M. Pierce, in speaking to
the members of the Oregon States
Dairy Council in quarterly session
here. The governor speaking as a
"dirt farmer" to his fellow men of
the soil declared in emphatic
terms that the burden of taxation
must be shifted from the agricul-
ture interests to others best able
to bear it.

"There was a time when all
property could be taxed at its full
value, but with the change in the
form of wealth and the rise of
such intangible forms of property
that can be safely hidden from the
appraiser in a safety depository
box it is the farmer who is caught
and pays the heavy charges," de-
clared the governor.

The income tax will reach these
"white collar" men who at pre-
sent are stepping out from under
and leaving the farmer to carry on
the state revenue. It must cease
even if some of this capital which
opposes the income tax leaves the
state, was the governor's state-
ment which proved to be popular
judging by the amount of applause
that he drew from his auditors.

The governor also told the
dairymen of his favorable stand
on the "oleo" measure and which
is receiving the support of the
council which plans an active
campaign with a view of the de-
feat of the referendum on the
question.

During the business session
Chester Mulkey of the McMinville
district was elected to the board
of directors of the state council.
This was the only office filled at
the meeting. The members voted
to send J. D. Mickie, secretary of
the council, to Syracuse, New
York, to attend the world dairy
council to be held this summer.
Professor R. V. Gunn, of the Ore-
gon Agricultural college, told of
the means employed by the
dairy industry and quoted fig-
ures on the increase in production
as a result of following scientific
methods.

study for drawing, methods in
arithmetic.

Thursday forenoon—Arithmetic,
history of education, psychology,
methods in geography, mechanical
drawing, domestic art, course of
study for domestic art.

Friday forenoon—Theory and
practice, orthography (spelling),
physical geography, English lit-
erature, chemistry.

Friday afternoon—School law,
geology, algebra, civil government.
Saturday forenoon—Geometry,
botany.

Saturday afternoon—General
history, bookkeeping.

20 NEW HOMES STARTED

BUILDING PERMITS SHOW AC-
TIVITY IN BUILDING

Valuation More Than Twice as
Much as That During May
of Last Year

Building permits in Eugene dur-
ing the month of May totaled
\$144,500, as compared with \$69,
700 in May last year, according to
W. H. Alexander, the city building
inspector. Of the 45 permits issued
last month 20 were for new resi-
dences and 13 for remodeling old
residences. Included in the new
residences were two small apart-
ment houses and one story house,
the last named to cost \$25-
000. One permit was for a con-
crete business building to cost
\$10,000. The fees for the building
permits amounted to \$128.75.

Plumbing permits numbered 44
and the fees amounted to \$97.66
while there were 45 electrical per-
mits and the fees were \$24.80. The
total amount in fees collected was
\$391.05.
