PLEASANT HILL GIVES

HONOR TO ITS PIONEERS

Tribute Paid Those Who

Blazed Trail of Long Ago

MEMORIAL DAY FITTING

Eloquent Eulogy Given in Tribute

to Those Who Braved Perils of Early Days

PLEASANT HILL, Ore., June 2.—It was the year of 1840 that a small group of men found their way from the east to Oregon and to Lane county. One man, Elijah Bristow, standing on the summit of a hill with the valley of the Willamette on his left, the valley of the Coast Fork on his right, the rolling foothills of the coast range behind him, facing the snow-capped peaks of the Cascades, said: "Here is where I shall live, die and be buried." It was on this hill, at the head of the grave of this honored pioneer, that more than 200 people met at the invitation of the Pleasant Hill community club to do honor not only to the soldiers of American wars, but to those soldiers who pioneered the way in the west.

Never did the cemetery look more beautiful; so well were the graves decorated that the appearance was that of a solid blanket of roses, peonies and other flowers.

Many School Children Gathered

At 1:30 p. m. the school children from the districts of Coast Fork, Edenville, Dexter, Trent, Enterprise and Pleasant Hill marched through the cemetery, playing a flag and a wreath made of fir boughs and roses, on the graves of 36 soldiers. As they marched back the assembly sang "The Star Spangled Banner," led by Ernest Wheeler of Trent, and supported by a chorus of trained voices. The assembly stood with bowed heads while Prof. M. E. Hays offered prayer. This was followed by the reading of general orders No. 11 by Comrade I. F. Circle. T. E. Haurigan gave Lincoln's Gettysburg address, and after the chorus sang "Scatter Sunshine" Mr. C. L. Williams, president of the Pleasant Hill community club, introduced Rev. E. V. Stivers of Eugene, who gave the memorial address.

Rev. Stivers Gives Eulogy
Rev. Stivers said in part: "It is hard to realize how much this memorial day means to the world, how extensive and far reaching it has become. The worth of an institution or a person depends upon what that institution or person has given to the world. We do not honor Lincoln because he was a great man, because he was president of the United States, but because he contributed something of value to the world. The worth of the United States is measured by what it can give to the whole world. It is fitting that we set aside a day to do honor to those who saved our nation and to those who redeemed the world. But as we stand here in the oldest cemetery in Lane county we do honor to the pioneers who were able to hew from the wilderness home and pave a way for us. They, as well as the soldiers of war, gave themselves voluntarily and freely for posterity." And again he said: "The fires of patriotism are burning in the hearts of the people the same as they ever burned. The men and women of the world war were actuated by the same patriotism as that of their fathers. Our nation is going to be victorious for right, truth and justice."

Be True to Trust, Is Plea
He concluded by saying: "To the veterans of foreign wars, to the pioneers who paved the way, to the young men who gave their lives in the world war we do honor and may we ever prove true to them, in any manner."

After "taps" by Chester Wheeler the people dispersed to pay silent tribute at the graves of the dead.

The committee in charge of the exercises was composed of C. E. Jordan, chairman, Mrs. M. E. Hays, Mrs. C. L. Williams, T. E. Hawrigan and Darwin Bristow. Comrade Elliott was color bearer. The soldiers' graves decorated with:
