BONDS SOLD BY LOTTERY

SOVIET REGIME IN SIBERIA ADOPTS THIS METHOD

(Correspondence of Associated Press.) VLADIVOSTOK, April 29.—The communist regime of the people's finances has reported the issue of 20,000,000 rubles in new bank notes. The face value of the bank notes will be 1,000, 2,500, and 5,000 rubles. These notes will be guaranteed by the gold reserve of the district, and it is hoped that in this way the circulation of the Japanese yen will be curtailed.

BUILDS SUPER-PLANES

GREAT BRITAIN TURNING OUT TWO HUGE MACHINES

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) LONDON, May 2.—Great Britain is building a super-airplane of 600 horsepower which will attempt to break the world's speed record this summer. It will be capable of a speed of 250 miles an hour, and will take part in the annual derby and the race around Britain for the king's cup. Later it will go to France and contend for the Gordon Bennett cup. It will be christened Mars XIV.

CLAIMS LEAGUE HONORS

BRITISH OFFICER ATTEMPTS TO TAKE GLORY

LONDON, March 21.—The latest attempt to take glory from men credited with high honors is that of a British Yeomanry officer, Lieutenant Colonel Frank Hilder, who declares he formulated the plan of the league of nations long before the idea was thought of by Woodrow Wilson.

He says he published a book called "A Scheme of Civilization" at his own expense which contained the plan for the league of nations, and which he circulated to all heads of governments of the world.

Colonel Hilder, who is a member of parliament, admits he got the original idea from the Roman Catholic league of nations which existed centuries ago.
