NAME NOT TO BE USED

MRS. HENDRICKS AND DAUGHTER URGE CHANGE

Not Willing to Allow High School to Bear Title of Late Banker if There Is Opposition

Mrs. Hendricks, widow of the late T. G. Hendricks, pioneer educator and banker, for whom the Hendricks high school was named a year or more ago, and her daughter, Mrs. Ruby Hendricks Goodrich, in a public statement, issued to the board of education and handed to the Morning Register yesterday for publication, urged the board to immediately restore the old name, Eugene high school, declaring that they do not wish the Hendricks name to be used if there

is opposition to it. The statement follows:
"Board of Directors, School District No. 4, Eugene, Oregon:
"Gentlemen—We have noticed in this morning's issue of the Eugene Register that the Eugene Parent-Teacher associations have requested your honorable board that there be submitted to the voters of the city the question of changing the name of the high school from Hendricks high school to Eugene high school, the article stating that at the time the high school was named Hendricks high school by action of the board there was opposition thereto, and that there is now opposition to retention of the name.

"The circumstances under which the high school was named for Mr. Hendricks are within the recollection of some of the members of the board. Two board members requested from the heirs of T. G. Hendricks a gift of a block of land near the high school and this request had been honored and the gift made. In appreciation thereof it was the voluntary suggestion of the board that the high school should be named for Mr. Hendricks, which, of course, was a compliment to his name and was at that time pleasing to us.

"The gift of the land was in no sense induced by the suggestion of the board that Mr. Hendricks' name be honored by the board and there is absolutely no reason why the board is not perfectly free to reverse its action and give the high school its original name. Had it been known to us at the time that there was opposition to this action of the board, we should not have consented thereto and learning now for the first time of such opposition, we regret exceedingly that the name of the high school was changed and are unwilling that Mr. Hendricks' name should further be used as part of its name. We therefore most earnestly and sincerely request that the board immediately take the appropriate action to change the name of the high school so as to eliminate Mr. Hendricks' name as a part thereof and to dispense with all controversy.

AERIAL UNIT MAY FORM

RESERVE CORPS IS PROSPECT FOR EUGENE

If Application Receives Favorable Action by War Department Recruiting Will Start

If application that has been made to the war department receives favorable action efforts will be made to organize a unit of the army reserve corps of the air service with headquarters in this city, according to E. C. Simmons, who reports that the proposal which was made last year to organize the unit here has been taken up with the army officials with prospects that some definite word will be received in the near future. Colonel W. E. Gilmore, commander of the air forces of the Ninth corps area, who was here last Sunday discussed the arrangement and that the plan will receive favorable consideration is the opinion of Mr. Simmons.

The organization of the reserve unit here was taken up with the army officials last year but no decision was reached at that time. A reserve unit would consist of 20 officers and 150 enlisted men who would be recruited in the district from Salem to Medford with headquarters at the municipal aviation field here. A permanent regular army personnel of one officer and six enlisted men would be stationed here at the local field and six ships would be maintained for the use of the training of the reserve flyers. The establishment of the training headquarters here will also mean the erection of the two steel hangars that were authorized last year by the war department but owing to lack of funds were not sent to the local field, according to Colonel Gilmore.

JENNINGS PETITION OUT

EPISCOPAL CHURCH RECTOR URGED FOR OFFICE

Backed for Member of School Board at Annual Election to Be Held June 18

That there will be competition for the two places to be filled on the Eugene school board at the election last June 18, is indicated by the circulation of a petition yesterday in behalf of Rev. Frederick G. Jennings, rector of the St. Mary's Episcopal church. The petition of Willard A. Elkins was filed Saturday and a petition requesting the nomination of E. L. Keeney, present member of the board, has been in circulation for the past two days with expectations that it will be filed this week.

If the two petitions now in circulation are filed three candidates will be in the running for the two positions on the board with strong indications that at least two more petitions are to be circulated in behalf of other candidates for the board membership. The petitioners are required to be filed at least five days prior to the election, according to O. H. Jones, clerk of the board, and one more week remains in which possible candidates may be nominated. The petition in behalf of Mr. Keeney was circulated yesterday at the noon luncheon of the Rotary club and is said to have received the approval of practically all present at the gathering.

MORE CAR OWNERS FINED

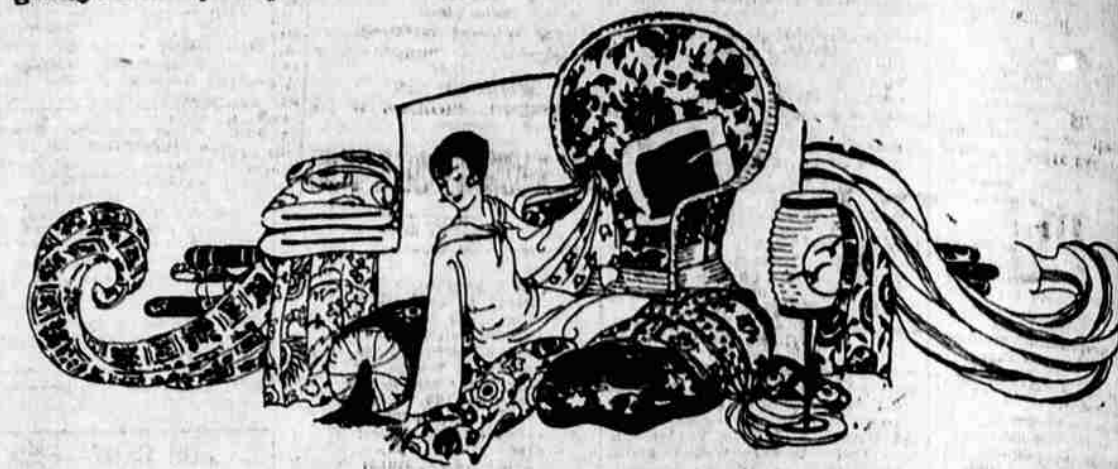
TRAFFIC OFFICER CITES MANY INTO COURT
