CRUSHER IS ABANDONED

COUNTY PLANT NEAR COBURG
HELD FAILURE

After several weeks and but little material turned out officials agree to quit. The county rock crusher that was set up by a county crew a few weeks ago near the Coburg bridge will be taken down at once and the rock for the market road which was to have been supplied from this crusher will be purchased from private properties in Linn county just beyond the Linn county line, according to an announcement by county officials.

This crusher has failed to work properly for some reason or another and but 200 yards of rock has been turned out. The expense has been very heavy compared with the results obtained so it was deemed best, the commissioners to dismantle the plant and buy the rock for this job. The road on which the rock from this crusher was to have been spread is the one leading from Coburg northwesterly toward Brownsville. The grading work is progressing well but the trucking has been slow on account of the difficulty with the crusher. Work of building the highway from the Coburg bridge through Coburg and to the Linn county line is getting along satisfactorily, the officials say. A. C. Hansen has this contract.
