Mr. Schroff is an Oregon artist who has received many honors in the East where he made his home before coming to the coast to take his post as head of the art department of the university.

Included in the 20 display pictures in the museum is a large oil painting, "Wind Swept Cypress," which took first prize at a recent exhibition of Western artists in Seattle. Schroff also won first mention this year in Springfield, Utah, where artists from all over the country were represented.
