DRILLING FOR OIL WILL BE STARTED TODAY NOON

Guaranty Company Ready For Active Operations
EVERYTHING IN READINESS

Dr. David Eugene Olsen Says He Confidently Expects to Succeed at Depth of 3000 Feet

Eugene Bible University well No. 1 of the Guaranty Oil company of Oregon, will be a reality tonight, if the plans of Dr. David Eugene Olsen, head of the company, do not fail. He announced yesterday that drilling operations will start some time today, perhaps about noon, as everything is in readiness except for the hanging of the bit, which will be done this morning, according to plans.

The derrick, which joms into the air to a height of 100 feet above the surface of the ground on top of a knoll on land owned by the Eugene Bible University, south of the Masonic cemetery, was finished a few days ago, and all machinery has been placed in position ready for the starting of the big drill today. All details have been attended to by four experienced oil drillers and it is expected that there will be no hitch at the beginning, as these men have superintended the erection of numerous derricks for Dr. Olsen and associates in the South and, according to the head of the local company, their work is thorough.

Fifteen-inch pipe will be used in the hole at first, said Dr. Olsen yesterday, and it is expected to finish the well with eight-inch pipe. He said there is enough on hand to sink a well 6000 feet deep, but that he confidently expects to strike oil in quantities at 4000 feet, as he has stated at numerous times previously.

Will Operate Continuously

The machinery will be kept running night and day, Sundays included, said Dr. Olsen. The four head drillers recently brought here will have charge and there will be a number of helpers on each shift. There will be two shifts, one beginning at noon and finishing at midnight and the other will be on duty from midnight until noon. The drill we kept in operation continuously, according to plans, it being the experience of other drillers that if a stop is made the well will freeze and a delay will result. Dr. Olsen would not predict how long it would take to reach a depth of 3000 feet, stating that it depends upon the formations through which the drills will have to pass. One oil well sunk by him, and his associates in Texas reached that depth in 29 days, while others sunk by them in California required a great deal more time than that.

The plant is equipped with electric lights, wires being strung from the city system to the plant. A 70-horsepower boiler will furnish power for the drill. There is 15,000 feet of casing on hand at the plant, said Dr. Olsen, and the entire outfit has cost the company approximately \$40,000 to date.

Nothing is lacking to make the plant complete, said the minister. "It has been erected by experienced men and we have spared no expense to get the best material and machinery."

The four head drillers in charge are Carlos Reeves, W. P. Reeves, E. M. Youngblood and Henry Martin, who have been employed by Dr. Olsen and associates for a number of years.

Dr. Olsen, despite a great deal of opposition, ridicule and discouragements, has gone ahead with his plans as if everybody was with him in the enterprise, and yesterday he was glowing with happiness and pride over the success of his plans thus far. He said that the company has let the contract for another derrick to be erected on Mount David on the outskirts of Cottage Grove.

The derrick out on the hill near the Masonic cemetery, has been visited by perhaps thousands of people in Eugene and this part of the valley since it was erected and now that drilling operations are under way, it is expected that it will attract visitors from all parts of the state.

AVIATION BOOSTED HERE

ARMY FLYER SAYS INTEREST KEEN IN EUGENE

Interest in aviation in this city is keen, according to Captain William E. Lynd, of the 40th bombing squadron of the air service stationed at Kelly field, San Antonio, Texas, who recently stopped at the flying field here on an aerial trip through the Northwest. Captain Lynd writes to Lieutenant R. M. Kelly, of this city, and states: "In the submitting of my report to the chief of the air service the newspaper items were asked for as determining the interest in aviation as shown at the various places. The most interest seemed to be in Eugene and I would like papers from there."

Captain Lynd in company with Sergeant English made the trip here last month from San Antonio to Denver, Portland, Eugene, San Francisco, Los Angeles, San Diego and El Paso to San Antonio. The air routes were charted by the army flyers at that time.

SONS OF A. R. ORGANIZE

LOCAL UNIT FORMED AT BANQUET AT OSBURN

Descendants of Fighters For Liberty Elect Professor Dunn President

Organization of a local unit of the Sons of the American Revolution was perfected at a banquet at the Hotel Osburn last night, attended by about 15 men of this city eligible to membership. This will be only a temporary organization, the members to retain their membership in the Oregon society at Portland, but both units will be entirely separate, it was announced. Professor Frederick S. Dunn was chosen president and John B. Patterson secretary. The membership here numbers about 25 without any special effort in canvassing.

The initial cost of entering the organization is \$11, of which \$5 goes to the national society, \$3 for initiation and \$3 for dues.

Professor Dunn said last night that he or any other member of the organization would be glad to get in touch with anyone eligible to membership and that they would willingly help them trace their ancestry.
