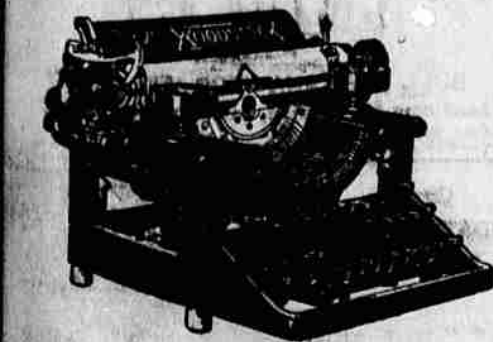

STOLEN CARS NUMEROUS
DO NOT BUY FROM STRANGERS, ADVICE OF JOE KELLER

"If you buy a used Ford, buy it only from an accredited dealer," is the warning issued by Joe Keller, who has charge of chasing stolen automobiles for one of the large underwriting agencies and who was in Eugene yesterday.

"Up in the Spokane country," he says, "they are stealing Fords at the rate of nine or ten a month and selling them to the farmers, and the practice seems to be rather general over the coast. We pick one up every once in a while and the farmer is out and injured. It is dangerous to buy a used car from a stranger, and there is no telling where he got it. The only way to be safe is to stick to the people you know."

NEW ROADS IN SOUTH LANE WILL BE ROLLED

Commissioners Make Promise to Large Delegation

WORK SOON TO BEGIN

Water Bound Macadam on Cottage Grove-Loraine Route to Be Used Instead of Loose Gravel

Fifty or more residents of Cottage Grove and vicinity, who called upon the county court in a body yesterday afternoon, were given assurance that if they so desire, water bound macadam surface will be placed on the Cottage Grove-Loraine highway instead of a loose gravel surface, as planned.

Members of the delegation, of which Elbert Bede, editor of the Sentinel, was chairman, stated that the people of Cottage Grove and those residing along the route of the highway were dissatisfied with the plan of surfacing the highway with loose gravel, and that they did not believe loose gravel would be as good as water bound macadam, such as has been laid on nearly all of the principal highways of the county during the past few years. Commissioners Emmett Sharp and L. N. Roney readily assented to the request and told the delegation that if it is the wish of the majority of the people, they would change their plans. County Judge Barnard has always been in favor of rolling the surface of the new highways.

Others to Be Rolled
The delegation also asked the commissioners to inform them as to the nature of the work to be done on the Cottage Grove and the Row River road, running east from that road toward the Bohemia mines. Both these roads are to be improved this year with bond money. The spokesmen stated that it was desired that these roads, too, be rolled, and the commissioners agreed to look into the matter. The delegation also asked that the county court be authorized to roll the surface of the new highways.

Slag to Be Hauled
The work will be started in a short time where the springs road crosses the Pacific highway, a short distance south of Cottage Grove, said Commissioner Sharp, and will be carried on toward the south. The commissioner said that engineers and road men had informed him that this slag is excellent for surfacing material.

JACOBS GIVEN DAMAGES
GETS VERDICT FOR \$450 FOR RIGHT-OF-WAY

Trials of Case of J. E. Thompson Against H. P. Larsen Result in Awarding Plaintiff \$450.88

S. H. Jacobs, of Dexter, yesterday was given a verdict by a circuit court jury of \$450 damages for his property to be taken in making changes in the Willamette highway now under construction by the state between Goshen and Lowell. The county court offered him a sum considerable less than that and a compromise was made previous to the trial of the case which was a mere formality, the verdict having been given on stipulation.

The state has another condemnation case to come up at this time of court in which Effie Demorest claims more damages for right-of-way on the same highway than the county court is willing to give.

The trial of the case against H. P. Larsen resulted in a verdict in favor of Thompson in the sum of \$450.88. Thompson sued for wages alleged due for work on Larsen's farm near Heceta, in the western part of Lane county. The case was tried at the last term of court but the jury at that time disagreed and this was a retrial of the case. The jury consisted of Monroe Hill, Richard Hileman, Otto Brabham, Fred Wallace, H. Y. Neaves, Sam Swafford, J. D. Wigle, Ben F. Mulkey, G. L. Prindel, J. W. Hockaday, C. M. Parker and A. F. Baker.

The case of the State Bank of Coburg against J. O. Bottla was settled and dismissed yesterday after the jury had been partially completed. The stipulation was that the bank would agree to accept \$60 as the amount due from Bottla.

G. G. Spurgeon, who had pleaded guilty to the charge of forging a check for \$20 and who was arrested in Portland, was given a sentence of two years in the state prison but was paroled to V. J. Phillips whose name he forged.

LIQUOR RAID NETS TWO
HENRY AND CHARLES HOLCOMB LAND IN JAIL

Three Barrels of "Champagne Cider" Are Found at Home Near Coburg By Deputies

Three barrels of "champagne cider," a small amount of moonshine liquor, and prospects that a still will be found today are the results of a raid last night in which Henry, 50, and Charles Holcomb, 44, residents of the Coburg district, landed in the county jail when arrested in the act of selling the illicit liquor. The raid was made by the county authorities on the home of Henry Holcomb, beyond the Coburg bridge, where the liquor was found on a truck ready to be sent away. Although the liquor was found there, the county officials state that Charles Holcomb has been the leader in the making and sale of the moonshine and will face the charge of manufacture.

The "champagne cider," which is said to be an apple product, was contained in three barrels of 32-gallons each. Only a small quantity of the "moon" was found, but the county officers report that they expect to find a still near the Holcomb home today. Henry Holcomb has a wife and family. Charles Holcomb has been working in the logging camps, according to the deputies. The county raiding party was composed of deputies Svarverud, Roach and two other officers. The liquor has been manufactured at the Holcomb place for the past two months, according to the report of the county officials.

DRILLING IS HELD UP
OIL RIGGING IS NOW READY FOR OPERATIONS

Realignment of Crown Block on Derrick Is Necessary Before Work Gets Under Way

Drilling for oil at the Eugene Bible university well number 1 south of the city which was to have started yesterday was held up owing to the drill being five inches out of plumb. The drillers yesterday reset the crown block and the rigging is now ready for operations which will be under way this morning, according to the report of Dr. David Eugene Olson, president of the Guaranty Oil company which is promoting the oil development plan here. The mechanical equipment is in first-class order and with the replacing of the block and the alignment of the drill expectations are that active operations will continue without a suspension after the drilling starts, is the report of the promoter.

A representative of the state corporation commission was here yesterday to inspect the plan of the Guaranty Oil company, and after looking over the preparations that have been made and an examination of the property, is said to have authorized the oil company to sell stock in the plan. The organization was recently incorporated but it is understood that no active sale of the securities of the concern has been made here pending the reports of the state commission.

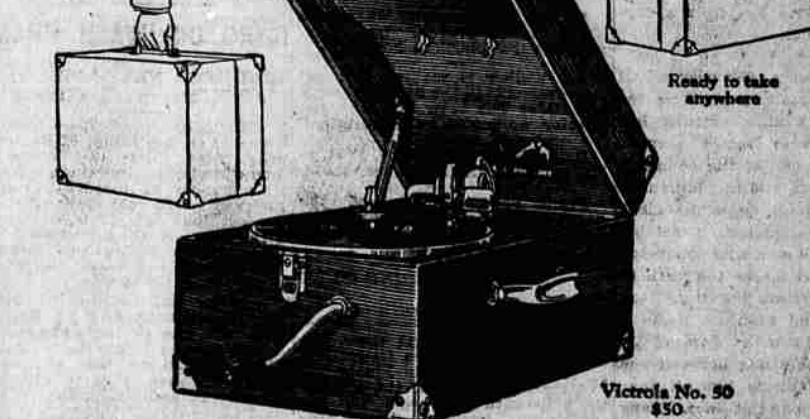
