MORTGAGES FORECLOSED

COLUMBIA STATE BANK GETS
JUDGMENTS HERE

Mrs. Caroline Shaffer Brings Di-
vorce Suit Against B. F.
Shaffer for Divorce

The Columbia County State bank
was given a decree of foreclosure
in two different mortgage cases
in Lane county yesterday. One
case was that of the bank against
L. R. Rutherford and others in
which a judgment in the sum of
\$7834.28 due on a promissory
note was given, with interest at
six per cent. from September 1,
1920; the further sum of \$200.11
taxes paid on the mortgaged prem-
ises with six per cent interest from
March 18, 1921; \$338.82 paid for
the care of the mortgaged prop-
erty and \$450 attorney fee.

The other case was that against
J. S. Allen, Jr., in which a judg-
ment was given in the sum of
\$3666.03 with interest at six per

cent from September 1, 1920;
\$100.35 paid for the care of the
mortgaged premises with six per
cent interest from May 1, 1921;
\$121.92 paid as taxes and \$300 at-
torney fee.

Divorce Case Filed
—Mrs. Caroline Shaffer yesterday
instituted suit against her hus-
band, B. F. Shaffer, for divorce,
alleging cruel and inhuman treat-
ment. Mrs. Shaffer claims that her
husband cursed and made light of
her, that he has refused to work

and that she has been compelled
to support herself and the child-
ren. She asks for the care and
custody of the children who are
as follows: Juanita, 13, Bennett,
12, Donald, 11, and Janet, 8. Wells
and Wells appear as her attorneys.
W. E. McCord and F. M. McCord
his wife, yesterday began suit in
circuit court against Ira Lewis
Rouse and others to correct a re-
form deed to \$3.44 acres of land in
section 11, township 19, south of
range 3 west.
