

MAYOR PARKS SELLS OUT TO ALBANY LUMBERMAN

Disposes of Interest In Walters-Parks Company

R.O. BUSHONG COMES HERE

Will Be Associated With F. C. Walters in Wholesale and Retail Business Here

A deal was completed yesterday in which Mayor E. B. Parks disposed of his interest in the Walters-Park Lumber company to R. O. Bushong, of Albany, Mr. Parks, who has recently built a large concrete storage warehouse on Pearl street north of the Southern Pacific tracks, says he will devote much of his time to that business. Mr. Bushong, who will at once begin his work with the Walters-Parks Lumber company, is a prac-

tical lumberman and office man, having had many years experience in the retail and wholesale lumber business. He intends to move his family to Eugene as soon as possible and make his permanent home here. The Walters-Parks Lumber company has developed an extensive wholesale and retail trade and is one of Eugene's heaviest rail shippers at the present time. Mr. Parks and F. C. Walters have been associated together for the past two and a half years and have built a large plant on the block bounded by Pearl and High streets, Fourth avenue east and the Southern Pacific tracks. Mr. Parks, previous to becoming associated with Mr. Walters, conducted the Elmira Retail Lumber company, and before that was a member of the Parks-Souls Lumber company, the Boutin-Parks Lumber company and the Fischer-Parks Lumber company, retail dealers, at different times. Mr. Walters, who will now be associated with Mr. Bushong, has spent the greater part of his life in the lumber business, first having been associated with his father, the late J. A. Walters. In the operation of the Elmira Lumber com-

pany's mill at Elmira, and afterward engaged in various other lumber enterprises.

\$600 AUDIT BILL IS PAID

HOLIDAY CELEBRATION PROGRAM IS OUTLINED

Legion Post Names Committees For Affair

MANY EVENTS PLANNED

July 4 Festival Here Will Be Largest Civic Attraction Ever Held In Promise

Organization of the various committees and the naming of the chairman for the staging of the July 4 celebration here were perfected at a meeting last night of the executive committee of Lane County, of the American Legion which is directing the plans for the affair. One of the largest civic events ever held here is the objective of the legion in co-operation with the business men, according to the enthusiastic reports of the veterans at the gathering. A big community welcome with a greeting for visitors from many parts of the Willamette valley is the promise of those who are in charge of the affair.

The sports committee is headed by Harry Powell, who will be assisted by the legionnaires and a committee composed of E. C. Simmons, W. A. Ayres, C. A. Burdett, J. K. Greer and Chet Daniels. This committee will prepare a program of games and sports that will be of interest to all classes in the region. Baseball, pony racing, foot races, horseshoe tossing, log rolling, and polo, climbing are a few of the details that are to be arranged for the big day, according to the legion members. Carlton Spencer is head of the entertainment committee.

Visitors to Be Greeted The accommodations committee is headed by C. S. Dillon, who will be assisted by William Polders and Mrs. M. S. Ady. This committee will arrange for the accommodation of the visitors, seats for the games and other entertainment events, and also for the maintaining of rest rooms for the guests of the city at the affair.

Raymond Torrey will have charge of the band and orchestra arrangements for the parade and dance and also for the band concert to be held the afternoon and evening. Harold Wells and Pat Koepke are in charge of the dance program. Whether the evening dance will be held in the armory or at some outdoor site has not yet been decided, according to the report of the committee. Harry Billmire and W. J. Hill compose the committee on concessions. The publicity committee is composed of Ben Dorris, J. E. Turnbull, E. E. Chadwick and Ernest Gilstrap.

Parade to Be Feature The details of the parade will be handled by a committee headed by S. S. George. The parade will be one of the attractive features of the celebration and efforts are to be made to have decorated cars and floats entered by all patriotic, civic and fraternal organizations of the city in addition to the various business houses and industrial establishments and units of the Farmers' union and of the Pomona grange. A series of cash prizes are to be awarded to the best entries in all classes, in the announcement. Plans for a baby parade are also being discussed.

Site of Games Obtained The games and sports will be held at the Southern Pacific property at Tenth and Eleventh avenues west and Willamette and Olive streets. The concessions will also be located there, according to the present plans being made. The use of the city park has not at any time been considered as a place for the celebration, according to legion officials, who report that the general sentiment of the organization was that the crowds would trample the grass and that this would mar the beauty of the park for the summer.

The financial committee which is soliciting the funds for the celebration reports that a sufficient amount will be on hand to hold the event to conform with the extensive plans that are being made. The financial committee is headed by J. Harold Beytlen, assisted by Carl G. Washburn, A. A. Rogers and Stanley Stevenson.
