DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE (By The Associated Press) PORTLAND, Ore., June 1.—Extreme stagnation with an overload of supplies is showing in the market for poultry along the wholesale way. Sales, whenever possible, are being made only at lower prices. The market for chickens is weaker along front street than during any period for several years past.

Sales of lightweight hens are slow even down to 12-13c a pound, while heavy hens are being quoted above 18c and 1-1-1/2 pound broilers are being offered down to 17c a pound.

The market for poultry is today so overloaded that the chief difficulty with retailers is not so much in securing prices, but in finding a buyer who is willing to purchase at all.

BUTTER SITUATION STEADY Market for butter shows a steady tone here with the half cent rise in the buying price of state cube extras eliminated. Purchases of butter at 42c asked for centralizer stock. Shipments continue to the South.

EGG TRADE IS INDIFFERENT Because of the fact that egg prices practically throughout the country have recently shown a lower range, while Portland has been steadily to firm, an indifferent tone is shown among f. o. b. buyers, although receipts are decreasing.
