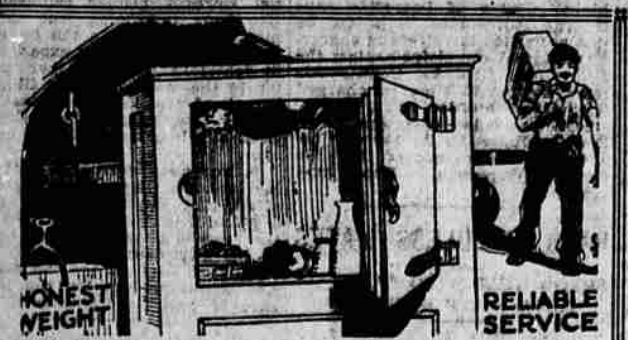

GRANGE ENDORSES LAWS
IRVING MEMBERS IN FAVOR DAIRY AND TAX ACTS

IRVING, Ore., June 9.—Irving grange at its last session adopted the following resolutions: Whereas, The last legislature passed an income tax and a dairy products adulteration law; and Whereas, Certain interests have been fit to petition that these laws be referred to the people; and Whereas, Certain newspapers have expressed a doubt as to how the agricultural interests of Oregon will cast their votes on these questions; and Whereas, An income tax law will relieve, to a great extent, the heavy burden of taxation borne by the agricultural interests; and Whereas, The dairy products adulteration law, if repealed will work a great injustice to the dairy interests of the state; Resolved, That the Irving Grange No. 377, in regular session, go on record as favoring these laws.
