

A. A. U. W. MAKES REPORT

OFFICERS ARE ELECTED AT ANNUAL MEETING

Organization Activities for Past Year Are Listed and Presented to Membership

Election of officers for the coming year and reports on the activities of the Eugene unit of the American Association of University Women were the chief matters of business at the annual meeting and picnic of the organization held yesterday at the Kerna farm. The following officers were elected: Miss Mabelle Hall, president; Mrs. J. B. Bell, vice-president; Miss Marion Taylor, secretary; Mrs. J. Lewis Johnson, treasurer; and Mrs. N. F. Macduff, corresponding secretary.

Reports were made that approximately \$200 was raised for the museum fund by the three plays presented by the University of Oregon dramatic department for the A. A. U. W. This will be the nucleus of the fund for the state museum planned by the A. A. U. W. for the U. of O. Mrs. F. L. Chambers is chairman of the museum committee. Reports were made that the present membership of the Eugene A. A. U. W. is 133, the largest since the organization was formed here.

The club house committee headed by Miss Dorothy Collier reported that during the past year a survey had been completed of the available places here for meetings of women's organizations. Data was also collected from other cities on the accommodations for women's organizations and the various ways that club house building plans had been financed. This data will be available if plans that have been discussed for the erection of a women's club house here are taken up.

Mrs. J. B. Bell is chairman of the committee that has collected information and material concerning the Oregon pioneers which

is part of the plan for the establishment of a pioneer room at the proposed U. of O. museum. The collection of works of art to replace those lost in the U. of O. fire last year was directed by a committee headed by Mrs. J. B. Bell.

Reports on the nutrition clinic for children held at the Condon school during the past year were made by Mrs. Herbert Clarke, chairman of the committee in charge of the clinic. The special service committee that worked in co-operation with Mrs. M. S. Ady is headed by Mrs. J. H. Gilbert. The committee to co-operate with the state industrial school for girls is under the direction of Mrs. H. B. Yocom.

The kindergarten committee headed by Mrs. Frank A. Nagley reported that during the past year a daily attendance of 25 children was recorded at the class held here. The plan of establishing dental clinics for children in this city was investigated by a committee headed by Miss Mattie Patterson. Conferences were held with local dentists in regard to the proposal. Material was also collected in regard to the children's clinics held in other cities with the view of forming similar clinics in Eugene. Mrs. J. B. Tingle reported on the activities of the committee in charge of the crippled children work of the A. A. U. W. chapter. Two children were treated regularly at the U. of O. gymnasium during the year, the committee reports.

OWEN FOUND NOT GUILTY

GOSHEN MAN ACQUITTED OF LIQUOR CHARGE

Fred Gishman, Monroe Butcher, May Appeal His Case to the State Supreme Court

H. Owen, the Goshen garage owner who was found guilty in Justice of the Peace Jesse G. Wells' court a short time ago on a charge of unlawful possession of liquor, was acquitted in the circuit court yesterday, the case having been appealed. The jury was out but a short time.

Owen was arrested a number of weeks ago after deputy sheriffs had watched his place for a number of nights. The place was under suspicion for a long time, they said, and they testified that they saw a man by the name of Bailey take liquor there but when the raid was made on the place only a small quantity of moonshine in a bottle was found. Owen and his wife testified that they did not know it was there and that it must have been "planted" there by an enemy in business.

The jury in this case consisted of Judge Addison, Richard Hilleman, J. D. Wigs, Sam Swafford, William Seavey, Monroe Hill, A. E. Baker, Herman Bjork, Clyde Sudwell, G. L. Prindle and G. W. Hockaday.

Howard M. Brownell defended Owen both in the justice and circuit courts.

Fred Gishman, the Monroe butcher found guilty by a jury Friday night of unlawful possession of liquor, will be sentenced by Judge Skipworth Monday morning. It is reported that he may appeal the case to the supreme court.

NEGOTIATIONS IN PORTLAND FAIL TO DEVELOP PEACE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9.—Negotiations between employing barbers and their union employees in an effort to avert a strike called for next Monday have failed, according to statements by both tonight. Twenty-five of the larger shops of the city are involved. Union officials said the barbers will refuse to go to work next Monday unless their demands are met. Ridding Cattle of Horns

Preventing the growth of horns on cattle, says the United States department of agriculture, is much more satisfactory than cutting them off later, and is much less painful to the animal. The method of prevention is simple. As soon as the budding horns of a calf can be felt as small "buttons" they may be stopped by clipping off the hair over them and rubbing the spot with a moistened stick of caustic potash which has been wrapped with paper to protect the hands from burning. The caustic must not be moistened enough so that it will run, for it is unnecessary irritation. A spot about the size of a dime, directly over the "button" should be made raw by rubbing with the caustic stick. Calves must be protected from rain to keep the caustic from running over the face.

Is your house rat proof? Rats are enemies of mankind, not only roaming about seeking what they may devour, but carrying in germs and filth and leaving on whatever they invade. If your house is not rat proof, it can be made so. Poison and traps will help you get rid of the rats now boarding with you. But to prevent garbage cans with tight-fitting covers and to keep your premises clean will help in preventing a pest of rats. The open garbage can invites rodents.

AMUNDSEN TO HOP OFF

STARTS ON POLE FLIGHT ABOUT JUNE 20

BERGEN, Norway, June 9.—It is now settled that Captain Roald Amundsen and his pilot, Omdal, will start on their North Pole flight from the Wright, Alaska, to Spitzbergen on or about June 20. The flight is expected to take about 22 hours.

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OIL DRILLING STARTS

OPERATIONS UNDER WAY AT E. B. U. WELL HERE

Active Work on the Search For Petroleum Will Continue at the Local Plant, Is Report

Operation of the drill at the Eugene Bible University well number 1 was started yesterday morning, and last night reports were that a depth of about 25 feet had been reached. Operations were started shortly before 10 o'clock, after the work had been held up for about two days owing to the necessity of realigning the crown block. Work will continue without suspension until the oil is struck, according to Dr. David E. Olson, president of the Guaranty Oil company, which is at work in the local field.

The oil concern is now authorized to sell stock, following the inspection of the plant here Thursday by W. E. Crews, of the state corporation commission. The firm is permitted to sell \$200,000 of the common capital stock. A total of \$300,000 of the capital of \$500,000 will be held in escrow and will not be listed with the assets in case of liquidation. A finance committee composed of Rev. J. S. McCallum, C. A. Olson, brother of Dr. Olson, and Jesse G. Wells, attorney for the concern, was named by the state corporation commission to handle the finances of the corporation.

Plans for the erection of a second derrick near Cottage Grove are under way, and it is reported by the officials of the concern that operations will start there in the near future.

PIGEONS DRINK "MOON"

IMBIBE FREELY OF WHISKEY AND CIDER
