PHI GAMMA DELTA WINS DOUGHNUT TRACK MEET

Victory Is Largely Due to Kelsey's Work

IS STAR OF FROTH TEAM

Bronze-Haired Athlete Rolls Up Total of 26 1/2 Points for His Fraternity

Phi Gamma Delta won the annual doughnut track and field meet yesterday afternoon with a score of 39 1/2 points. The victory may be largely attributed to the brilliant performance of Walt Kelsey, bronze-haired star of the froth team, Kelsey alone turned in a total of 26 1/2 points with first in the high hurdles, the low hurdles, the broad jump, second places in the hundred yard dash and the high jump and a tie for second in the pole vault.

Five places counted in the meet which was undoubtedly the fastest doughnut track and field meet ever staged at the University of Oregon. The order in which the competing houses finished follows: Phi Gamma Delta 39 1/2, Sigma Chi 36, Delta Tau Delta 22 1/2, Kappa Sigma 25, Phi Kappa Psi 23, Sigma Alpha Epsilon 15, Alpha Tau Omega 11, Oregon club 9, Phi Delta Theta 7, Beta Theta Pi 4, Kappa Delta Phi 3 and Phi Sigma Pi 3.

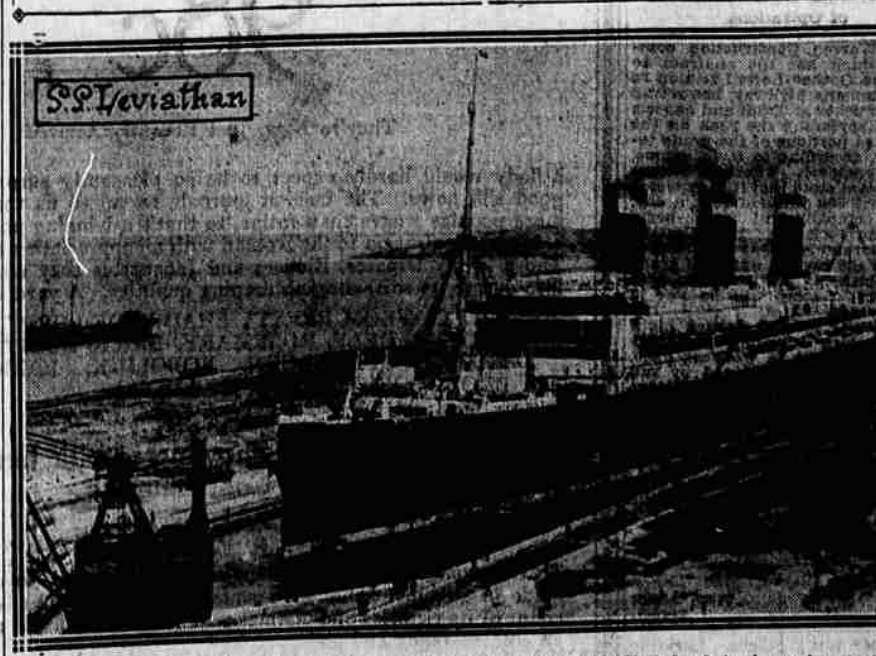

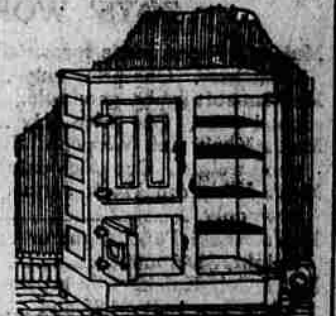
