OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., June 11.—There is a generally active tone in the market for mixed color eggs with the price of these ruling practically as high as for the white stock, a very unusual condition for recent years. Payment of 25c is now generally reported for mixed color standards and even for current receipts, where the latter have not been tampered with. One firm was reported paying as high as 23 1/2c in a limited way, while another was quoted as paying 24c for small lots. As the general bid for henneries is now around 24c a dozen, this creates a very unusual condition. Here and there, henneries are bringing a fraction more.

BUTTER SITUATION STEADY
Practically no change was shown in the market for butter during the opening session of the week. Local trade conditions were steady, with purchases of state cube extras at 40c and retail prices at 40 1/2c a pound. Very excellent demand for dairy at 30c.

CHEESE MARKET IS ACTIVE
Very good demand is showing in the cheese trade. With the exception of one house, all firms are said to be maintaining quotations, and especially so for Tillamook offerings.

POULTRY TREND IS SLUGGISH
Sluggish trend is showing in the market for poultry. Monday is always a dull day, and the week was no exception to the rule. Retailers and killers have ample stocks for the immediate future.
