

WORM IS MENACE

INSPECTOR SAYS NOW

IN TIME TO SPRAY

Caused Heavy Loss Down Valley Last Year and Damages May Be Repeated

The first clear, warm day of the present showers, cherry growers should spray for the cherry fruit maggot, advises C. E. fruit inspector. The standard spray applied in the valley last year was a lead arsenate, one-half percent, with molasses, two percent, and water, six gallons. Three applications should be given: The first when the adult flies appear; the second about the time the fruit begins to swell; and the third when the fruit is about good color, or June 8 to 20; a second application should follow ten days later, and a third one week after the second. Two applications will suffice if carefully timed. Rain will interfere. Rain will wash the effect of previous applications and necessitate a repetition of the spray.

Spray should be applied at the rate of about one pint to the bush. The solution, as applied to the upper surface of the fruit, will cause the adult flies to feed upon it. Seeding and adjacent foliage should be treated as well.

Cherry fruit maggot, says Stewart, caused heavy loss in the valley last year, and if it is not controlled it will be a menace to the cherry growers.

CARMEN'S PAY HELD UP

SEATTLE BANKS NOT TO CASH

STREET RAILWAY CHECKS

SEATTLE, Wash., June 11.—

Banks affiliated with the Seattle

clearing house association will de-

cline to cash \$143,000 in municipal

street railway salary warrants

issued today, a committee rep-

resenting the clearing house in-

formed the city council this after-

noon. The refusal was based on

the financial condition of the rail-

way system, which showed a de-

ficit of more than \$3000 a day un-

der the five-cent fare established

March 1. What action will be

taken by employees of the system

is "problematical," according to

Perry Hackler, secretary of the

street car men's union.

Under an ordinance recently

passed fares will be raised to ten

cents cash or three rides for 25

cents effective July 4.

SEATTLE PSYCHICS ROW

DOYLE DUBS OBJECTORS OF

PICTURES "FOOLS"

SEATTLE, Wash., June 11.—

Those members of the Seattle So-

ciety of Psychic research who

sought to persuade Sir Arthur

Conan Doyle not to exhibit certain

answers the description of the

widow. Sherman has denied that

his wife was Mrs. Dowd.
