ELECTION DATE DIFFERS

UNION HIGH SCHOOLS VOTE MONDAY, JUNE 25
Union high schools which are supported by more than two or less than six districts will hold their annual elections at a different time from the regular district elections, according to a new law passed by the last legislature. E. J. Moore, county school superintendent, yesterday called attention to the new law, which provides that such union districts shall hold their elections the fourth Monday in June or the sixth instead of the 15th, which is the third Monday.

HEALTH MUST BE GOOD

STUDENTS MUST UNDERGO PHYSICAL EXAMINATION
Those admitted to the university as freshmen next year will have to undergo medical examinations during the pre-registration week, September 24 to 29, according to announcement by Dr. W. E. Livingston of the university health service, who said he would summon a number of Portland physicians to aid in this work. Examinations administered prior to the opening of the university will eliminate interruption or delay in classwork and will afford more time for re-examination of special cases. Students will be enabled to arrange their class gymnasium work to suit their needs physically, and students advised to withdraw on account of ill health may do so before risking breakdown in health or spread of disease.

MEAT CUTTERS ASK RISE

PORTLAND UNION DEMANDS \$40 A WEEK MINIMUM
PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—The meat cutters' union has demanded an eight-hour day and a \$40 a week minimum scale instead of the nine-hour day and \$35 minimum, which has been in effect, according to C. S. Hartwig, business agent for the union. Men who were called out of a market returned to work pending outcome of negotiations, according to Hartwig, who said that the union will call no general strike, but will continue to hold to its demands until its demands are met in case more peaceful settlement is not available.
