

JACK DEMPSEY 'NOT AT HOME' TO FIGHT FANS

Gibbons Is Host to Attorney General Rankin

(By The Associated Press) GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 12.—The camp of the world's champion Jack Dempsey today was strongly reminded of the training establishment maintained two years ago at Manhasset, Long Island, by Georges Carpentier.

Montana as his guest of honor, Tommy Gibbons, the St. Paul champion, swapped punches with five agile and earnest sparring partners today in the most gruelling session he has experienced since he pitched his camp in the shadow of the huge arena on the outskirts of Shelby. Tille Herman, Los Angeles welterweight, with the dust of travel still on his face, forced Gibbons to exert his punch and counter to the limit for one round. In a hectic second round, the challenger retaliated for the telling blows of Herman which had found their mark in the first. The two resorted to lightning in the first round, trading blows at close quarters. When Gibbons extended himself in the second, utilizing his footwork and unloosed his punch, Herman, worn down, was unable to stem the furious attacks. Kid Rocco, another welter, with one eye still closed as a result of leading with his head against Dempsey, which opened a cut over the champion's eye, found a long reach useless in two rounds with Gibbons. Dan Dorey, a Shelby lad, who weighs 150 pounds, learned considerable about boxing in one round from the St. Paul fighter.

Dundee Shakes Mitchell MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 12.—Johnny Dundee, New York, through his aggressiveness, was given a newspaper shade decision over Ritchie Mitchell, local lightweight, in a 10-round, no-decision boxing bout tonight, which went the limit. Each boxer shook the

other up on several occasions, though there were no knockdowns and both boys finished practically without a blemish.

BRITISH AND AMERICAN HU, MOB CLASH AT PIER

NEW YORK, June 12.—British and American humor clashed at the Acquaintance's pier in New York City today when E. S. Agnew, director of Punch, appeared on his way home, and Irvin S. Cobb, came puffing up with Mrs. Cobb and his daughter, Elizabeth, whom he was seeing off.

"I have observed that Americans laugh more than the British," said Mr. Agnew to the ship news reporters. "But there are too many gigglers in America. It requires too little effort to make Americans laugh. America though, is a very happy country. I attribute this to the fact that America is more prosperous than England."

"Americans," Mr. Cobb retorted, when remarks had been relayed to him, "have a better sense of humor than the British because they laugh the British to death. The British can't laugh very well because it is difficult to laugh over adenoids, with which all Britishers are afflicted."

Jews Killed in Pogroms

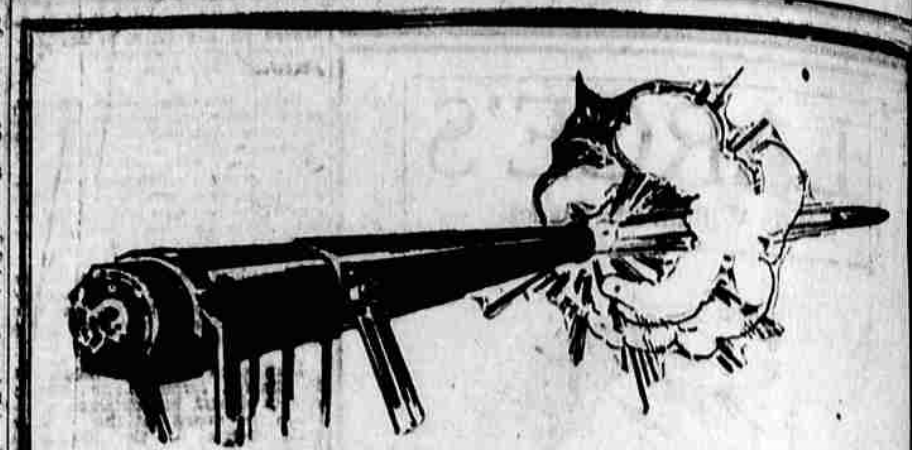

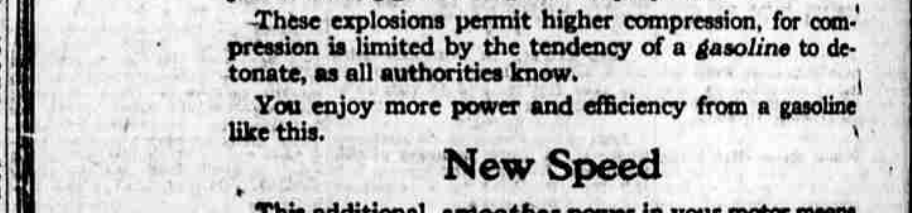
