VERDICT FOR \$326 GIVEN

CREDIT SERVICE COMPANY WINS IN COURT CASE

Jury Chosen in Action of Hayburn Against Norton to Foreclose Land Contract

The Service Credit company of Portland yesterday was given a verdict against W. W. Bristow and C. C. Carter, as the Luckey Jewelry company, in the sum of \$326.49 alleged due on a bill of goods shipped to them by M. Seiler and company wholesale jewelers of Portland. Seth Laraway, who was also made a defendant in the case, was given a non-suit. This is a case wherein Bristow and Carter claimed that a portion of the goods shipped to them was intended for Laraway.

The next case to come up was that of Wilbur L. Rayburn against H. P. Norton to foreclose a land sale contract. A jury as follows was taken: Richard Hilmen, J. D. Wagle, T. C. Devaney, J. W. Hockaday, Henry Taylor, Loren Scribner, William McDee, William Wills, P. H. Magee, Monroe Hills and G. L. Prindel.

MAN DIES FROM INJURY

L. A. BABCOCK FATALLY HURT AT MILL

Big Slab Stricks Eugene Man While at Work in Plant of Penn Lumber Company

L. A. Babcock, aged 59, and residing at 510 Van Buren street, Eugene, died at the Mercy hospital yesterday afternoon as a result of injuries sustained in the mill of the Penn Lumber company at Penn, west of Eugene, on the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific, Monday afternoon.

A slab of wood weighing perhaps 100 pounds struck him with great force inflicting internal injuries. He was brought to Eugene on the train that afternoon in an unconscious state and remained so until he died nearly 24 hours afterward.

He is survived by his widow and two sons, Fay C. Babcock, of Oro Fino, Idaho, and Leo D. Babcock, of Mosesaw, Canada.

The funeral will be held at the Veach chapel Friday, June 15, at 2 p. m. Rev. Charles E. Dunham, of the Baptist church will conduct the services.

OFFICERS TO TAKE RIDE

PHYSICAL FITNESS TEST TO BE HELD THIS EVENING

Thirty miles of horseback riding is the program slated this evening for the three mounted officers of the national guard of this city. Major W. G. White, commander of the first battalion of the 186th Infantry, Captain Orville Waller, commander of the Eugene medical detachment and Captain W. H. Dale, commander of the Lebanon medicals, will take the ride up the McKenzie highway and are required to complete the trip within six hours, according to the regulations of the state guard officials.

The ride is a test of physical fitness of the mounted guard officers and is required of all mounted officers of the state troops to be completed prior to the annual camp each year.

NEW TILE BUILDING 30 BY 114 FEET IS PLANNED

Another New Structure to Go Up on Auto Row

PROPERTY IS PURCHASED

Iddings and Martin, Who Conduct Tire and Repair Shop on Seventh Avenue, to Build

Immediate erection of a hollow tile and concrete building 30 by 114 feet on Pearl and Park streets adjoining the garage of the Pacific Auto company on the south was announced yesterday by Iddings and Martin, who now conduct a tire shop and automobile repair shop on Seventh avenue east in the rear of Otto's confectionery.

E. J. Iddings and Lester M. Martin during the past few days purchased this property from W. W. Calkins, president of the United States National bank, and his brother, S. M. Calkins, local attorney, who had owned it for a number of years. Roy Stein, local contractor, is now drawing the plans for the structure which will cover the entire lot.

The new building will give the firm much more room than it has at present. Its quarters on Seventh avenue are badly congested but in the new building, which, according to the plans, will be modern in every way, there will be plenty of room.

The site of the new structure is at present covered with a dilapidated wooden building which has long been used for a blacksmith shop. The work of tearing it down will be started at once, it was announced.

Mr. Iddings has been associated with Mr. Martin since April 1, having charge of the auto repair department, while Mr. Martin has been in the tire business for a year and a half. R. A. Reinheimer has also been associated with them in the repair department and will be with them in their new building.

With entrances on both Pearl and Park streets the new shop will be well lighted as well as being easy of access and convenient for their patrons.

KUBLI TO SPEAK HERE

STATE LEGISLATOR COMING FOR CELEBRATION

Legion Post Executive Committee Outlines Plans for Speaking and Band Concert July 4

K. K. Kubli, of Portland, speaker of the lower house of the Oregon state legislature, will be the principal speaker at the July 4 celebration to be held here under the direction of Lane County post of the American Legion, according to the announcement last night at a meeting of the executive committee of the organization. Kubli is scheduled to speak in the forenoon following a band concert that will start at 9:30. The place of the speaking has not been decided. The county court has granted permission for the speaking and concert at the city park but has barred other forms of entertainment and concessions from the county property.

A tentative outline of some of the entertainment features for the holiday celebration were discussed by the executive committee. Negotiations have been started between the legion post and the Hitt Fireworks company of Seattle for the presentation of the fireworks display. A parachute jumper who will leap from an airplane over the fairgrounds is also to be brought here from San Francisco for the event, the committee announced. Air plane stunts by Lieutenant R. M. Kelly, of this city, is also a part of the entertainment committee.

The parade will start at 11 a. m. following the band concert and speaking and races and other games are scheduled to be held starting at one p. m. prior to the show to be held at the fair grounds.

Friday forenoon—Theory and practice, orthography (spelling), physical geography, English literature, chemistry.

Friday afternoon—School law, geology, algebra, civil government.

Saturday forenoon—Geometry, botany.

Saturday afternoon—General history, bookkeeping.

August 12—Baptist church, Rev. C. E. Dunham.


August 19—Congregational church, Dr. E. V. Stivers.


