DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—Weakness is shown in spots throughout the local butter trade. Noticeable lack of snap is indicated for cubes generally, with state extras around 30-32 as an extreme. While some of the centralizers are still holding for as high as 41c for their best cubes, still others are indicated beyond 40-40 1/2-2c pound. While there is no change in the price of prints in sight at the opening of the Wednesday trade, still the weakness in cubes is likely to be an adverse influence. Considering everything, the production of butter here is wonderfully heavy. Everywhere in this territory surplus production is shown and storage on the East Side Farmers' market, was in a limited way at \$1.35-\$1.50 for tops, but the bulk of the butter sold at \$1.25-\$1.35. On front street sales from \$1.25 to \$1.35 in a small way.

STRAWBERRY PRICES BROKEN
Because of the rose festival, strawberry prices are broken. Sales on the East Side Farmers' market, were in a limited way at \$1.35-\$1.50 for tops, but the bulk of the berries sold at \$1.25-\$1.35. On front street sales from \$1.25 to \$1.35 in a small way.

CHERRY PRICE IS SLUMPING

LITTLE demand is shown for cherries and prices continue to slump. Quality is generally better in prevailing supply, this being perhaps the greatest reason for the lack of snap in the trade. Most bulk stock at 80-82c pound.

HOG MARKET IS QUOTED SLOW
While only limited supplies are reaching the front street trade, a very slow demand is shown for country-killed hogs. Bulk of the tops moving at 11c, although one or two head may have brought an extra cent. Vails are steadier, with the bulk of the tops around 13-12c.

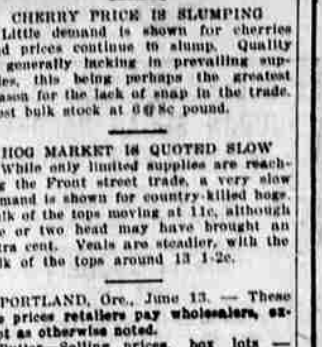
