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these criticisms, there is much to be said for this suggestion, coming simultaneously from various sources—that if there is to be a free trial voyage of the Leviathan, it would be better to select disabled service men as guests. There would be a special fitness in such a pleasure trip for veterans, on the gigantic liner that served America so well as a troop ship in the war.

MUSIC AND MEDICINE
The New York Nursery and Child's Hospital has found, in a practical test, that music is "good medicine." It works, the resident physician says, equally well with mothers, babies and sick children. "Whether it is the appeal of rhythm," he adds, "we do not know, but the tests have demonstrated for a certainty that music has a marked therapeutic effect on the spirits and general morale of hospital patients." And what improves a patient's spirits and morale improves his physical health.

The idea may be carried much farther. Music is good medicine for everybody, whether his ailment be mental or physical, or if he has no ailment at all—provided it is good music. That bars jazz, except in very unusual cases—sleeping sickness, for example.

The latest scheme to beat the prohibition law is to get a permit to use liquor for dietary purposes. Considering the kind of liquor obtainable nowadays, these foxy schemers are apt to find out who put the "die" in dietary.

President Harding's father, who has just passed his 79th birthday anniversary, explains that the first thing he does each day is to read the morning papers. There's a fine tip for those who want to live to a ripe old age.

The caterpillars that are traveling along the tracks of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad have made five miles in a week. Persons familiar with schedules over that way will regard this as pretty good time.

French authorities seized 30 billion German marks at Dortmund the other day as a penalty for the killing of two French soldiers. Evidently they hold human life pretty cheap.

Austria sets a good example in that respect. Austria was as great a sinner as Germany in starting and waging the war, and suffered a severe punishment; but unlike Germany Austria took her medicine, acknowledged her fault and gave promise of repentance. Wherefore Austria's enemies came to her aid and she is now getting on her feet again.

If Germany would stop whining and hedging and equivocating and passing the buck and would admit her guilt and indicate an honest desire to repair the wrong she has done, the deadlock would be broken and she would find friends to help her work out her salvation. As long as she maintains the attitude of sullen, self-righteous defiance that has characterized her since the end of the war, she will find only enemies wherever she turns.

SOFIA, June 12.—3:10 P. M.—Peace and stability for Bulgaria with fulfillment of her international obligations and harmony with her neighbors are the aims of the new Bulgarian government, declared Christo Kallioff, the new minister of foreign affairs, in a statement given to the Associated Press today.

The new government, it is pointed out, is one of young men, only the premier being more than 45 years old. The parliament was dissolved in order to replace the theory that it was elected by methods that resulted in charges of fraud and wholesale violence against Premier Stambulsky. The new constitution provides that elections must occur within two months, has not yet been fixed. Premier Zankoff said today. A permanent ministry will be formed on the basis of these elections.

wages were owing them, and they returned to work the next evening, but the president and others in authority charged that both the cabinet crisis and the police strike were part of a plot to replace his regime with a militaristic government. The scheme of the police walkout apparently was to cause disorder in the city, so that troops would be "forced" to take over the situation. In some quarters it was said that Marshal Tiao Kun, head of the powerful Chihli military party, was slated for the presidency.

President Li, secluded in his residence here until this morning, deciding to quit only when convinced that he could not reorganize the cabinet. In a recent interview he recalled that his resignation had been placed in the hands of parliament months ago, though never acted on. He suggested that parliament accept it if it considered desirable but declared he would not turn China over to the military. He said a telegraphed Marshal Tiao and General Wu Pei-fu, commander of the armies supporting the Peking government, asking them what they intended to do.

Li Yuan-Hung has had a distinguished public career. Trained as a naval officer, he was in command in 1911 of the land forces of the revolution that forced out the Manchus and established a republic in China. After serving twice as vice-president he became president in 1916 and resigned a year later after the coup d'etat of a rival general had effected a restoration of the Manchus. The republic was quickly re-established, but Li refused to resume the executive office.

He remained in retirement in Tien Tsin until a year ago almost to the day, when, responding to a nationwide demand for his services in the effort to reunite the country, he returned to Peking and the presidency.

Inviting Sun Yat-sen, the southern leader and opponent to the Peking government to meet him and discuss China's future, Li called on all the provinces to support him in his attempt to reconcile the differences that had split the country into armed factions.

"It is my inclination," he said in a manifesto, "to stay until death in Tien Tsin, my home. I have no more desire to see the people of the world. I am old. What ambition I have is only that I long to see reunion, and would lay down my life to bring it about a day earlier."

Since then he has waged a losing fight against the provincial military systems, the various opponents of the Peking government, the dissensions within his administration. He was hampered by financial difficulties and by several cabinet crises.

Many Scatter in Terror
Fearing violence at the hands of the Sofia regime, a few of Stambulsky's ministers who are still at large, and hundreds of officials identified with the former government, are scattering in terror in all directions.

M. Douralkoff, former minister of agriculture, was arrested at the Turkish frontier while attempting to escape.

It is considered probable that the ex-ministers will be tried under a special law passed by the agrarian government for the punishment of those responsible for wars. If this should happen it would mean that ex-Premier Stambulsky and his colleagues will be punished by the very measures under which they sought to punish their former rivals in cabinet positions.

All the Balkan capitals are gravely apprehensive over the possibility that the organized Macedonian revolutionaries comprising the most virile and highly patriotic elements in Bulgaria may attempt by military measures to realize their long cherished dream of an independent Macedonia. Those who know them declare that the home of every one is a miniature arsenal and that they are ready to respond at the slightest signal from their leaders in Sofia.

Appointment Viewed With Alarm
Jugo-Slavalka, according to press dispatches, views with special alarm the appointment of Professor Moleff as director of the political department of the Sofia foreign office, as he is alleged to be one of the principal leaders of the comitadje incursions into Jugo-Slavia and closely identified with the Macedonian revolutionaries. Cabinet meetings are being held in Belgrade, Bucharest and Athens to consider the consequences of the Sofia upheaval and Serbian Rumanian and Greek troops are being mobilized along the frontiers.

ALL INDUSTRY IN WEST SHORT OF SKILLED HELP
CONDITION PREVAILED DURING MAY, SAYS REPORT
Pronounced Shortage Exists in Farm Labor While Logging Operations on Increase
SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—A scarcity of skilled workers in nearly all branches of industry in the West during May is noted in the monthly report of J. A. Kelly, San Francisco director of the United States department of labor, made public here today. There are fewer men out of employment, Mr. Kelly's report shows than at any time during the past 12 months.

Pronounced shortage exists in farm labor. Employment conditions in the steel industry are exceedingly bright. Coal almost alone showed a slight falling off due to seasonal curtailments, the report says.

Favorable weather has resulted in increased logging activities, particularly in Washington, Oregon and Idaho. These states now employ over 100,000 men in the mills and camps, and the demand continues greater than the supply.

Building and road construction is under way on a large scale. All building tradesmen in the large cities are fully employed. Road work is drawing heavily on the available supply of common labor.
