DR. RICHARD A. BOLT, IS SPEAKER AT BANQUET

Medical Director of American Child Health Association Is Guest at Joint Meeting

Dr. Richard A. Bolt, of Baltimore, medical director of the American Child Health Association, was the guest and principal speaker at the joint meeting and banquet of the Lane County Medical Association and the Round Table Club held last evening at the Eugene hotel. The gathering was planned by the medical organization and members were guests at the event. Last Saturday evening the Round Table members will be the guests of the medical society at a joint banquet and meeting to be held at the hotel. Dr. T. W. Harris is scheduled to speak on some personal experiences and observations. About 50 members of both organizations were present at the gathering last evening.

Dr. Bolt, who is on a tour of the Pacific coast, will deliver a series of

medical lectures at the summer school sessions of Stanford University and the University of California. Dr. Bolt last evening, in his talk, made a plea for co-operation of the public with the members of the medical profession for the betterment of child health. Efforts toward the raising of the standard of health of children was stressed by the doctor, who also pointed out the need of care and attention in maternity cases.

While the crop of Royal Anne and the other larger varieties is short this year, the earlier soft variety is more plentiful. The Kentish or "pie" cherries are also plentiful.

The Royal Annes will begin to come in about the latter part of next week, predicted J. O. Holt, manager of the association.

If the weather remains clear today and during the next few days quite a quantity of strawberries will be in, said the manager, as there is still many yet unripe and the crop is good. Thus far most of them have been handled by stores and markets.

NEW BUILDING FAVORED

POLICY OF SCHOOL BOARD CHAIRMAN LAKED

Ben F. Keeney Says Action in Ordering Addition to High School Irregular

EUGENE, Ore., June 14.—(To the Editor)—I have just discovered that my name is being confused with that of Edgar L. Keeney, of the wholesale house of Lang and company, who is a candidate for school director. I am not a candidate for this position, but I am grateful that business matters became an attending a regular meeting of the school board Wednesday evening which afforded me an opportunity of realizing more fully the responsibilities devolving upon these officials.

I am especially interested in and wish to commend, the building program as outlined by Chairman Hollis W. Libby, and I feel that all taxpayers and school patrons of the district should familiarize themselves with the policy he has proposed. In brief, it is the erection of a suitable building centrally located to accommodate the seventh eighth and ninth grades and thus relieve the present high school building of the ninth grade and the grade buildings of the seventh and eighth grades, and remove the necessity of remodeling and enlarging the high school at a cost of several thousand dollars—an undertaking which was disclosed at this meeting as already begun and well under way with nine persons at work, without official action on the part of the board or receiving bids on plans and specifications as contemplated by law and in the best interest of the taxpayers.

This erroneous procedure, however, was opposed and blocked at this meeting by the opposition of Chairman Libby, Mrs. Ward and Mrs. Loomis, who contended that the procedure was not only irregular and unethical but that it failed as a solution to the problem of giving relief to the congested conditions throughout the grades, and that it afforded very little additional classroom facilities in the high school.

RAIN DOES LOTS OF GOOD

ALL FARM CROPS ARE BENEFITED BY MOISTURE

Over Inch of Precipitation Recorded During Past Four Days and Ground Is Soaked

One and fourteen hundredths inches of rain has fallen in Eugene this far this month and farmers declare that should there not be another drop of rain until fall their crops will be good, although another good shower about July 1 would not come amiss.

During the past four days of showers, which now seem to be over, the precipitation was 1.02 inches. The ground is soaked, a considerable depth and all grain and vegetable crops were given a great impetus. Even the ground was soaked to a depth sufficient to reach the tree roots and the moisture will benefit fruit crops of all kinds. Berries will be larger than if the rains had failed to come and everything has a bright aspect.

FLOOD DEBRIS REMOVED

TULSA AND SAND SPRINGS REHABILITATE AREAS

TULSA, Okla., June 14.—The task of rehabilitating the mud-smeared and water-soaked flood area between Tulsa and Sand Springs and in West Tulsa, was under way tonight as the Arkansas river continued to recede. At 9 o'clock tonight the river gauge showed 18 feet above normal, a drop of nearly four feet from the high mark of yesterday.

The thousands of flood refugees who fled before the rush of water into their homes two and three nights ago, were penetrating the mud-cluttered sections.

No accurate estimate of local damage can yet be made, but the total loss will exceed \$1,000,000.

Damage to the St. Louis and San Francisco railway in Kansas and Oklahoma will cost the road approximately \$500,000, according to President J. M. Kurn, who was in Tulsa today.

PARK HIGHWAY ROUTES

PORTLAND TOPIC TODAY

CONVENTION OF ASSOCIATION STATED THERE

Meeting Is to Consider Links in Shape of Connecting Roads and to Select Routes

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—(Special to the Register)—A convention of the National Park Highway association will be held tomorrow in Portland. Officials from a number of the national parks of the West will be present. The meeting is to consider links in the shape of roads connecting the various national parks and select the best routes for tourists to take who desire to motor from one to the other. The parks are in various Western states and it is the desire of the association to make them a grand tour for motorists.

Crater lake is a national park in Oregon, which makes this state particularly interested in the highway program. A tentative route selected to reach Crater lake is from Medford to the lake and return. This route does not meet with favor from Klamath Falls citizens, who have sent representatives to plead their cause.

The people of Klamath Falls want the highway association to route the tourists from Medford to the lake and out by way of Klamath Falls or to send the tourists in through Klamath Falls and out by way of Medford to the Pacific highway. By this arrangement, contend the Klamath people, tourists will see more country and will not have to travel twice over the same road.

PUBLIC DOMAIN IN SIX STATES OPEN TO ENTRY

FORMER SERVICE MEN GIVEN GRANTS IN WEST

More Than 250,000 Acres Are Designated for Homesteading by Interior Department Order

WASHINGTON, June 14.—More than 250,000 acres of public lands in six western states were ordered thrown open today by the interior department for homestead entry to former service men of the world war. Exact dates for the filing of entries will be announced by the land offices in the various states. The tracts include 3800 acres in Fresno county, Cal., near Riverdale; 33,000 acres in Montezuma county, Colo., near Durango; 64,500 acres in Power county, Idaho, near American Falls; 37,500 acres in Phillips county, near Landusky and Fergus county, near Winfred, Mont.; 12,800 acres in Teton county, Mont.; 44,000 acres in Emery county, near Ferron, in Wayne county, near Torrey, and in Mildred county, near Clear Lake, Utah; 59,000 acres in Carbon county, near Saverly and in Hot Springs county, near Thermopolis, Wyo.

In addition, approximately 21,900 acres in Emery county, Utah, will be thrown open to entry after the state has made such selections as cover public land grants already made to it.

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The special train carrying the republic's ousted chief executive reached Yangtun, outside Tientsin, last night and there it came to a sudden stop. On investigation it developed that another special, bearing Wang Cheng Ping, Yang Tseh and other Chihli party leaders, had arrived and that its armed guard had held up the president's engineer at their gun muzzles. The two trains then were coupled together and proceeded into the Tientsin central station.
