LLOYD SMALL IS COMING

U. OF W. MAN WILL BE ASSIST-
ANT IN MATHEMATICS

Next fall the University of Ore-
gon will add Lloyd L. Small to
its faculty as assistant professor
in the mathematics department.
Professor Small, who now holds
a similar position at the University
of Washington, made a brilliant
record for himself as undergrad-
uate and graduate at that institu-
tion, said Professor E. E. DeCou,
head of the mathematics depart-
ment here. He has recently writ-
ten a book entitled "Elements of
the Theory of Infinite Processes,"
which will be published in July.

Professor Small will spend six
weeks this summer in research
work at the University of Califor-
nia library. He has previously
attended the university at Berke-
ley, having taken his doctor's de-
gree in mathematics with special
honors there. Following the term
in the University of California, he
will return to Seattle to teach
during the second term of the
summer session at the University
of Washington and in September
expects to arrive in Eugene to
make his home.

NEW TAXES IN TURKEY
AROUSE MUCH CRITICISM

GRAND ASSEMBLY AT ANGORA
IS CLOISTERED BODY

Decree Has Been Issued Increas-
ing Income Tax Fivefold,
to Include Foreigners

(Correspondence of The Associated Press)

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 9.—
The grand national assembly sits
in its capital at Angora, barred
from contact with the outside
world, almost inaccessible even to
foreign diplomats whose inter-
course must be through the medi-
um of Dr. Adnan Bey, its repre-
sentative in Constantinople. The
government thus lives in an at-
mosphere of its own creation, un-
affected by foreign comment on
its actions, and to this condition
is attributed some recent govern-
mental actions which have aroused
a measurable degree of foreign
criticism.

Until recently the duty on flour
into Turkey was one per cent. On
March 1 the rate was advanced to
5 per cent, and now retroactive
on all stocks still in warehouse
and which had paid the old duty
of one per cent. It is recognized
that the question of this duty is
clearly a matter of internal ad-
ministration, and it is accepted as
such; only with the retroactive as-
pect have foreigners found fault.

A decree has been issued increas-
ing the income tax fivefold, and
to include foreigners, and retro-
spective to the date of the for-
eigner's arrival in Turkey.

Another law increases the con-
sumption tax on a certain fat
product from 5 to 80 piasters, and
it affects large stocks at present
in transit contracted for when the
levy was only 5 piasters.

In local business circles these
unusual and unusual proceedings
are ascribed largely to the ignor-
ance of popular government and
yet unused to the intricacies of
economic legislation. It is felt
that the deputies do not realize the
far-reaching effects of such meas-
ures, nor their reaction in western
lands.
