MILL OUTLOOK BRIGHT

PROSPECTS FOR GOOD CROP HELD OUT TO INDUSTRY

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., June 16.—Prospects for a prosperous milling year are unusually bright, declares G. G. Bushman, president of the Springfield Mill and Grain company here. Mr. Bushman has been making a survey of grain conditions in the Northwest, and particularly in the Willamette valley, and has recently returned from the annual meeting of the valley grain men held at Salem.

"Weather conditions have been almost ideal for a bumper crop of wheat," says Mr. Bushman, "and this means that millers will be able to turn flour out at a cost that will allow them to compete on the export market. The price of wheat

ROSE GARDEN PRAISED

J. W. COFFIN HOME BANKED BY BEAUTIFUL BLOOMS

Springfield Residence Is Mecca for Lovers of Artistic Landscape Gardening

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., June 16.—Lovers of flowers, people who appreciate a well-kept landscape, need but to go to Springfield to the attractive home of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Coffin, on the corner of Tenth and A streets, to behold an example of real natural art. Although the summer is well along, thousands of roses of all varieties are still blooming on the bushes, and the wide cool porch of the neat residence is banked on either side by fragrant blooms.

Mrs. Coffin is justly proud of her roses, and at the rose show held here two weeks ago she took first prize in class one, with her Ophelia, and second prize in class two and four, with Hilling-ton and Bruner.

Although few may know the names of the many varieties that thrive around the home, no one could fail to appreciate their beauty. In the front yard, orderly set out in the ever-green lawn, are bushes of Carol Watson, a lovely pink; the Valley Beauty, that in the bud is rich yellow, which turns to a glowing pink as it matures, and the Purty, which remains a pure white. Then at the right of the house are found the delicate Cecil Bruner, so favored for corsages and decorations; the prize-winning Ophelia, sweetly scented in France, very rare and highly prized; the favorite Lady Hilling-ton, and what might be termed the most lustrous of all, the glowing Irish Fire Flame.

Planting this array Mr. Coffin a few years ago planted a row of filbert shrubs. These have thrived remarkably, and now are bearing every year, in addition to adding to the beauty of the landscape.

On the other side of the shrubs more roses are found in greater profusion, for here the bushes

will be lower per bushel for the farmer, but the greatly increased yield will more than make up for this.

"The past year, due to a short crop, has not been conducive to extensive milling operations, since wheat was so high, hence little effort to any more than handle domestic orders has been made. Now, however, with the excellent crop prospects in view, export orders for next year are already being booked. This means an increase in employment in the Northwest, and indicates a period of prosperity for everyone, since all industries are more or less dependent on the grain situation."

Mr. Bushman has devoted his life to the grain and flour business, and is regarded as an authority on this phase of industry in the Willamette valley.

RINEHART REUNION ENDS

GREAT TIMES ARE ENJOYED BY WELL-KNOWN CLAN

All Varieties of Entertainment Indulged In—Next Meet at Mayville, Oregon

SPRINGFIELD, Ore., June 16.—Unique in pleasure, and this pleasure allotted to only a few, are the family reunions held by the families of Oregon pioneers. Nearly all of Oregon's present residents have come to this state within the last few years—hence they are denied the genuine enjoyment that the famed family, known as the Rinehart clan, enjoyed this week at the home of T. E. Edwards, four miles east of here. Over eighty came from all parts of the Pacific coast for this great event, the twenty-first in history, and every moment was lively and full of enjoyment for all. All varieties of games were indulged in and programs, dances, picnic roasts and other forms of entertainment were provided.

The business meeting was held yesterday, at which time Mayville, Oregon, was selected as the meeting place next year. The gathering will be held on the 1600-acre cattle ranch of the Edwards brothers, on Tuley Mile creek, and already extensive plans are being made for the event.

The grand prize for the largest family in attendance this year went to Jim Dyer, of Mayville, who is the proud father of ten children. Lee Rinehart is second with eight, and Bert Edwards, also of Mayville, takes third honors with seven. The three families account for 31 of those present.

Athletics indulged in. Yesterday afternoon was devoted to athletics, the camp being divided into two teams, one being known as Oregon and the other O. A. C. Both sides claim the meet, and since things happened in a hazy manner, the judges kept it, it was declared a tie and will probably be settled next year at Mayville.

Thursday evening the family gathered under the "big tent" and in addition to a well-received program of music, talks and stunts, movies and slides showing the origins of the family, and scenes from earlier times were shown. While the showing of the "old folk" was conducive to many pleasant reminiscences, the older members in attendance paid many a serious tribute to their integrity and bravery, their earnest application to the hard work of helping a home in a strange country and to their courageous faith that never faltered during their struggles.

Keith Edwards and Earl Rinehart and wife, who were unavoidably detained, arrived yesterday, and made a grand total of 33 in attendance this year. The reunion came to an end last night and most of the clan have left for their various homes.

"It was a grand time," said T. E. Edwards, "and I'm sorry it had to end so soon. We're all looking eagerly forward to next year now, for every year the Rinehart reunion is bigger and better than ever."
