SCHOOL MEETING IS HELD

DIRECTORS AND PATRONS GATHER AT CRESWELL

(Register Lane County Special)
CRESWELL, Ore., June 18.—The annual meeting of the school district No. 40, duly called by notice, was held at the assembly room of the school house this afternoon. H. A. Howe presiding in the absence and at the request of Chairman A. R. Land. There were thirty-five patrons present and a most harmonious meeting resulted. The clerk's report was read and adopted. Dr. D. A. Forster was chosen unanimously as director for three years, taking the place of A. R. Land who declined to accept another term. Miss Elizabeth Tryon was re-elected clerk.

The board of directors through H. A. Howe reported that they had been pleased with the support of the patrons the last year. An expression of support of the faculty in offering teachers training courses as provided by law was given. This will enable practice work under the supervision of the local school grade teachers and give an opportunity for students to teach after graduating from high school.

R. F. Scott spoke of the need of a new heating plant and a committee consisting of Mr. Scott and H. A. Howe was appointed to investigate the cost of installing a suitable plant and calling a special meeting for that purpose. Mr. Scott stated that at the present time the school was using ten stoves and most of them were in need of repairs. A vote of thanks was tendered both Mr. Land and Miss Tryon for their services in the interests of the school the past year.

He was also a member of the district school board for many years and was faithful to his duties as a citizen whenever called upon.

PLEASANT HILL PICNIC

REVELS ENJOYED BY ALL

Day Perfect One For Annual Sylvan Hilarity

PLEASANT HILL, Ore., June 18.—The thirty-fifth annual picnic at Pleasant Hill is history, the gathering that assembled last Saturday was one that has often occurred. Despite the near cloud burst that broke in all its fury on the placid hill and date of Pleasant Hill Friday afternoon and the threatened inclemency of Saturday morning, gave some showers, the day might be interrupted by another downpour of former days, but the mists cleared away giving the picnicers more assurance of a "perfect day" some coming out from Eugene, however, were overtaken by a shower and turned back fearing the day would be spoiled by precipitation that would not enthrust the average boy, girl, man or woman bent on the pleasure of the annual picnic at Pleasant Hill, but soon they were assured of a better day to follow and made the second start.

Bit of History is Fitting

A little history might be of interest to some, of the historic place of Pleasant Hill. The first public school district in Lane county was organized at Pleasant Hill. The first Christian church in the Northwest was organized at Pleasant Hill. The first cemetery in Lane county was started at Pleasant Hill. The first union high school in the state of Oregon was organized at Pleasant Hill and as far as we know Pleasant Hill is the only community in Lane county that has had an annual picnic for any number of years.

The first picnic held at Pleasant Hill, from the best information obtainable, was held in May 1870 or 1871. Then in 1882 a small picnic gathering was held in the old historic church. Then again on the tenth of July, 1883 a school picnic was held. A few years intervened when a picnic in 1888 was held in a grove just west of the present grounds, this marking the date of our annual picnic of which this last one is the 35th annual of the Pleasant Hill picnic.

Notice is hereby given that subject to the conditions and limitations of the acts of June 9, 1916 (39 Stat. 2183), February 28, 1919 (40 Stat. 1179), and June 4, 1920 (41 Stat. 758), and departmental regulations of September 15, 1917 (40 L. D. 447), and June 22, 1920 (47 L. D. 411), the timber on the following lands will be sold July 20, 1923, at 10 o'clock a. m., at public auction at the United States land office at Roseburg, Oregon, to the highest bidder at not less than the appraised value as shown by this notice, sale will be subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior. The purchase price, with an additional sum of one-tenth of 1 per cent thereof, being commissions allowed, must be deposited at time of sale, money to be returned if sale is not approved, otherwise national will issue for the timber which must be removed within ten years. Bids will be received from citizens of the United States, or from corporations organized under the laws of the United States, or any State, Territory, or the District of Columbia, or from any application of a qualified purchaser the timber on any local subdivision will be offered separately before being included in any other sale.

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
