May Take Part of Day on Sick Leave—Postal employees throughout the nation will hereafter be able to report a sick leave for less than a day, instead of being "sick all day if sick at all," according to word received at the Eugene postoffice. Under the old rule the least deduction that could be made for sickness was one day's pay. The hour will be the new unit, beginning July 1. The purpose, it is said, is to encourage workers who report for duty when slightly indisposed, in the hope that their illness will soon "clear off" and also to avoid penalizing by one day's pay those who may be taken ill while on duty. The new regulation applies to all carriers, city and rural; all clerks, motor vehicle employees, all office terminal and transfer employees of

the railway mail laborers at first and second class offices. Annual leave will also be computed on the minimum hour basis.

COLLECTION TO BE SHOWN

INDIAN WORK WILL BE ON EXHIBITION AT UNIVERSITY

Opening of Display Loaned by Mrs. Ada Bradley Millican Takes Place Saturday

An important event of commencement week at the University of Oregon will be the formal opening of the Ada Bradley Millican loan collection of baskets, blankets, weapons and other specimens of Indian handicraft. The opening will be from 3 to 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The collection, arranged in specially-made museum cases, is on the third floor of the woman's building.

Mrs. Millican, whose understanding of the Indians and appreciation of their art led to the accumulation of one of the finest collections in America, will be present at Saturday's opening.

It is expected that large numbers of alumni, former students, undergraduates and university faculty members and townspeople will view the collection. Large numbers will be drawn to the woman's building to see the collection and also to attend the annual reception for alumni and members of the graduating class scheduled for the same time at alumni hall.

The Indian specimens include some of the finest work of western Indians. The basket-makers, potters and weavers of the entire West coast and the Southwest from the Alaskan islands to the Mexican border have contributed to the collection.

The collection was acquired over a long period of years. It is said to have few rivals outside of the Smithsonian institution and the museum in the Yosemite national park. Interest in the arts and industries of the aboriginal tribes has grown so rapidly in recent years that collections of the products of these arts and industries have come to be unusually valuable.

What is, in effect, a dedication of the collection is contained on a card in one of the cases and reads as follows: "Indian basketry is poetry, music, art and life itself woven exquisitely together out of dreams and sent out into a thoughtless world in appealing messages which will one day, far away, when the poor lovely dark women who wove them are no more."

ROLLER BREAKS DOWN

MACHINE CAUSES DELAY IN STREET CAR TRAFFIC

For more than two hours yesterday afternoon street car traffic on Willamette street was disarranged because of the breakdown of a big steam roller in the middle of the intersection at Fifth avenue and

Willamette street. The roller, which had been unloaded from a car on the Southern Pacific tracks, had been started for Goshen, where it will be used by Force and Curigan, who have the contract to repair the pavement on the highway, when the king bolt broke, disengaging the front roller from the rest of the machine.

Jacks were employed and the front end of the machine was fastened to a motor truck and taken out of the way of the street cars. Cars went as far north as Eighth avenue, then turned around on the "Y" at that intersection.

DRILL IS DOWN 90 FEET

OPERATIONS CONTINUE AT OIL WELL HERE

With Depth of 150 Feet Walking Beam Will Be Started and Work Is Expected to Speed Up

Drilling operations at the well of the Guaranty Oil company are progressing satisfactorily and last night a depth of close to 90 feet was reported by Dr. David Eugene Olson, promoter of the oil development in this county. The pit ten feet wide and 20 feet in depth has been completed and for the past two days the drill has been in steady operation in the boring for the oil. The hole is not being cased yet as the drillers report that no casing is used until the indications of caving in are noted. So far the ground has been hard and the casing has not been necessary, in the report.

It is expected that the speed of the drilling will be increased when a depth of about 150 feet is reached as at that depth the walking beam of the rig can be put in operation, according to the drillers. Owing to mechanical difficulties the walking beam can not be used when the drilling is near the ground surface.

The boring is kept clear of water and residue by the operation of a plunger after each seven or eight feet of boring is completed. The bit and cable of the driller is withdrawn from the hole and the plunger is dropped and the hole cleared for the further action of the bit, according to the drill crew.

W. A. Sage, one of the directors of the company, accompanied by Howard R. Hurlbut, was here yesterday from San Francisco to inspect the local property.
