

SHORTENED WORKOUT IS JACK DEMPSEY REGIME

Champion Said to Have Reached Pink of Condition TREATS TRAINERS ROUGH

With Cold Sores on His Lip Tommy Gibbons Eliminates Boxing From His Daily Grind

(By The Associated Press) GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 20.—Working in his indoor gymnasium during the fury of a driving hail and rain storm, Jack Dempsey today engaged in a shortened workout under orders of Manager Jack Kearns, who believes the champion has reached the peak of his training, with his title contest with Tommy Gibbons just two weeks away.

Dempsey limited his boxing to four rounds, but included in the usual round of bag punching and shadow boxing. Boxing experts agreed the champion displayed much improvement in form over yesterday as he punched more accurately, with greater speed and appeared to have more drive back of his blows.

Bill Wolpin, a 170-pounder from Appleton, Wis., who arrived in camp this morning in search of work, was on the floor three times during the two rounds he was in the ring. When he crawled out, with unsteady legs, his face was smeared with blood which dripped from his battered nose.

Thrills Entailed in Workout The champion's workout with the Wisconsin light-heavyweight gave the crowd all the thrills of a real fight. From the start, Dempsey crowded his new sparring mate, who appeared to be anxious but cautious. In an exciting clash on the ropes, Dempsey drove a left hook to Wolpin's jaw which almost knocked him outside the ropes. The champion picked him up and wrestled him around in a clinch for a few seconds, flooring him for the second time with a right and left to the jaw. The punches lifted Wolpin squarely off his feet.

Wolpin responded for the second round with most of the desire to trade punches knocked out of him. A few seconds to the body had him covering up. Dempsey, however, with a quick feint, whipped over a left, knocking Wolpin flat for the third time. He was on the verge of going over for the fourth knockdown when Dempsey mercifully clinched and eased up until the round ended.

TROUT EGG BROOD LARGE

AHEAD OF ANY STATE IN THE UNION HAYS WARDEN

Oregon will have the largest trout egg brood of any state in the union this year, according to information compiled by A. E. Burghoff, state game warden, and announced by Matt Rickman, of this city, superintendent of hatcheries. Approximately 39,000,000 trout eggs will be placed in hatcheries of the state.

For several weeks California has been boasting that its trout egg brood was the largest ever taken in the United States, the total for that state being given as 20,000,000.
