TO INSTALL SIGMA XI

OREGON HAS CHAPTER OF NATIONAL SOCIETY

Professor Ward, University of Illinois, and Dean Ellery of Union College Will Be Here

A chapter of the society of Sigma Xi, national honorary scientific research fraternity, will be installed today on the campus of the University of Oregon by Professor Henry B. Ward, of the University of Illinois, who is president of the society, and by Dean Edward Ellery, of Union college, Schenectady, New York.

The installation ceremony will take place in the women's building on the campus at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and will be followed with a banquet at the Anchorage tea house at 6:30. The banquet will be open to outsiders and will be featured with addresses from the installing officers, visiting delegates, President P. L. Campbell of the university and Colin V. Dymond, dean of the college.

The Oregon chapter of Sigma Xi was granted by a unanimous vote to the University of Oregon at the national convention held jointly at Harvard and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology last December. Sigma Xi is the greatest honor that can be conferred for individual work in scientific research, and is to the sciences what Phi Beta Kappa is to liberal arts. The Oregon chapter was granted to the state university for the work that has been done here in scientific research.

There are 27 foundation members who will take place in the ceremony this afternoon. Of this number 16 are members of the organization already, having been elected to membership at other installations. The following are already members of Sigma Xi: William P. Allen, Robert L. Next fall further elections to membership in Sigma Xi will take place and at that time it is possible that students who have done outstanding work in science may be elected with faculty members. Delegates from other institutions who are known to be coming are Professor Nathan Fasten, of Oregon Agricultural college and Professor John Weinert and Roy M.

Winger, of the University of Washington. Members of the fraternity who are at the medical school at Portland are also expected to attend.

BASEMENT TO BE BUILT

HASKELL STORE WILL HAVE STORAGE SPACE

A. C. Granzer, proprietor of the Haskell feed and grocery store at the southwest corner of Ninth avenue west and Olive street, has let the contract to the W. W.
