'GROUP' SCHEDULE MADE

SUNDAY SCHOOL MISSIONARY OUTLINES WORK

Meetings Will Be Held in Various Districts in Lane and Douglas Counties

A schedule of meetings for the third annual American Sunday school union "group gatherings" in Lane county has been completed by Gordon C. Griffin, missionary for this county, and preparations are being made for the largest attendance in the history of this district, he says. While the work is under the direction of Mr. Griffin, the officers and committees are appointed by the various Sunday schools.

The schedule of these "group gatherings" follows: July 1—Cottage Grove district, meeting at Hastings' grove, on Mosby creek.

July 2—Spencer creek district, meeting at LeBlanc school houses.

July 3—McKenzie valley district, meeting at state fish hatchery.

July 4—Roseburg district, meeting at Ellard bridge.

July 5—Cox creek district, meeting at John's ranch.

August 5—Middle Fork district, meeting at Landax.

Several smaller meetings will be held in other districts where new Sunday schools have recently been organized, but no schedule has yet been arranged.

The purpose of "group gatherings" and the necessary organization is to promote such co-operative relations with other union schools as may lead to mutual benefit and develop each as a social, moral and religious force in the community in which it is located, explained Mr. Griffin. The district missionary is enabled to more frequently and helpfully meet the people through the agency of the "group gatherings." Denominational schools can join in these gatherings, but if recognized in advance that the group is and always must remain, entirely non-denominational in all of its relations, he said.

A new feature of this year's program will be a large united Sunday school session for a portion of the morning hour. Teachers who have been previously selected will take charge of the respective classes. Further announcements of programs for the various districts will be made at a later date.

A. R. Gray is vice-president for the Eugene district, and B. L. Eddy is vice-president for the Roseburg district.

ESCAPES MAY BE HIDING

THREE MEN WADE ACROSS BRANCH OF RIVER

Farmers Report Mysterious Footprints at Robinson's Grove North of City

Three men who may have been three of the four convicts who escaped from the state prison at Salem a few days ago and who are thought to have come this way, took off their shoes and socks and waded across a branch of the Willamette river at Robinson's grove near the J. S. Luckey farm about eight miles below Eugene some time Wednesday night or yesterday afternoon. These farmers said the tracks were fresh and were not there Wednesday and there were no tracks where the men re-crossed the stream.

The stream at that point is only about two feet deep and the men could have waded it easily, said the farmers. The men crossed over to an island where they may possibly be hiding.

People living opposite this island said last night that they have heard the voices of men across the stream. The escaped men are Wynner Willis, eight years from Multnomah county for larceny; George Holtsclaw, sentenced from Douglas county in 1922 for two years for burglary; Lee Willis, five years from Multnomah, assault with intent to rob, March 9, 1923, and William Johnson, five years from Josephine county, larceny, September 26, 1922.

ROAD TO BE INSPECTED

COMMISSIONERS GO TO LOOK AT S. P. JOB

County Commissioners L. N. Roney and Emmett Sharp were called to the lower Willamette yesterday to inspect another section of the road being built down the north bank of the Siuslaw river by the Southern Pacific company and formal acceptance is expected to be made upon their return.

The railway company has been at work for the past year or more building this road which takes the place of the one destroyed 12 years ago when the company built its Coos Bay branch line.

County Judge Barnard said yesterday that the contract with the Southern Pacific company calls for a road to be built from Coos Bay whenever a section of the road is completed but no notice of the kind has ever been given on any of the sections as far as he knows. At any rate none is on record, he said.

ROAD CONTRACT IS GIVEN

WARREN COMPANY GETS JOB ON COAST SECTION

The Warren Construction company has been awarded the contract to build a section of the Roosevelt highway between Devil's lake and Siletz bay in Lincoln county for \$207,864.20, according to word received at the office of E. S. Shiley, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest in this city. This is forest road project but is a link of the state highway that is being built along the coast of Oregon from the mouth of the Columbia river to the California line.

This will complete the highway to the Siletz bay, the other sections north of there to Astoria having previously been built. A few more miles will complete it to Newport, said Mr. Shiley.
