## UMPHREY NEW DIRECTOR

## SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION IS HELD AT COTTAGE GROVE

(Register Lane County Special)  
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., June 21.—C. E. Umphrey was re-elected as director of the school board to serve three years and Worth Harvey as clerk to serve one year at the annual school meeting Monday afternoon. The re-election of the two was unanimous, each receiving 25 votes. H. J. Shinn will be the new chairman of the board. He is starting his third year of service on the board, of which C. E. Umphrey is the retiring chairman.

During the past year the board has provided for a serial bond issue whereby in ten years the present bonded indebtedness of the district totaling \$40,000 will be reduced \$25,000 and save over \$900 interest to the district. Should there be no other issue during the next decade the district will have but \$15,000 indebtedness at the end of that period.

The district now has uncollected taxes and other revenue amounting to \$13,674.47 while the outstanding warrants total but \$9,500.01.

## FUNERAL TAKES PLACE AT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The husband and all of the children except the eldest and youngest, Mrs. Lella Hileman, of Eugene, and Shepherd Smith, of Cresswell, have passed on. There are thirty-three grandchildren also to mourn her loss.

Mr. Stivers told of the glory of the Christian in old age. Mrs. Smith being a devout Christian lady and a member of the Christian church. He used a text from the old testament, "In the twilight of life, there shall be light," which expressed the joy in the transition from a life of service to old age on earth to the beginning of life eternal with God.

The ball bearers were Thos. Silkwood, John Stone, S. D. Reed, A. H. Pohl, Joe. Weber and Thos. Brown. Interment was in Cresswell cemetery. Friends tendered beautiful flowers in abundance as a testimonial of respect.
