CIVIC PARK IS PROPOSED

SPRINGFIELD L. L. L. MAKES PLANS FOR PROJECT

Municipal Center Gains Support of Prominent Citizens—Playground Held Necessary

(Register Lane County Special)
SPRINGFIELD, Ore., June 23.—The project for a municipal city park proposed by the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen at their meeting last Tuesday night, is meeting with great favor among the business men and officials of the city. A committee consisting of Ernest Skinner, chairman; R. W. Martin and D. W. McKinnon has been at work on the plan and has tentatively selected several sites that might be acceptable. It is expected that another committee to work along this line will be appointed at the meeting of the chamber of commerce Monday night, and it is probable that the Civic club, parent-teacher organization, the American Legion, and other community bodies will assist in any way possible.

The present baseball grounds at Fifth street is being considered and another site, which possesses natural advantages such as a grove of trees, a flat and a hill slope, is located in the Emerald Heights district at about G and Kelly streets. This plot could be obtained cheap, it is believed, and could easily be fixed up for a park. Water is piped to that district, so that a lawn could be maintained. Plans discussed for the park include a first-class baseball diamond, a substantial grandstand, a band stand, playground apparatus such as swings, merry-go-rounds, slides and teeters, a recreation spot that would be grass-covered and provided with plenty of benches and ample space with tables for outdoor picnics and entertainments.

Finances Are Discussed
No definite plan for financing the project has yet been adopted.

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but several are talked of as probable solutions. One is that the various civic organizations pledge themselves to a certain amount of payment to be spread over a period of time. The Loyal Legion is also talking of purchasing the grounds through the city, and then presenting it to the city, and an appropriation be included in the city budget for the maintenance of the equipment.

The need for a place for the children to play that will take them away from the downtown streets is very evident, especially in the summer time, declared J. W. Coffin, city recorder, in speaking of the proposed plan. "As a community center it will also be a great asset to our city, since it will provide a common meeting place for everybody," Mr. Coffin favors the Emerald Heights location, pointing out that the natural grove there would provide shade, and that the hill there provides a natural site for a grandstand, from which to view contests on the grassy flat that could be easily made into a first class athletic field.

W. F. Walker, president of the chamber of commerce, who has declared himself heartily in accord with the idea, states that it is his belief that every organization in the city will back the proposition, or the other side, not the other way for Springfield," he says, "and now that the city has begun to develop, there is no reason why we should not have a playground. A municipal playground will more than pay for itself in the years to come by building better men and women for the city."

Opportunity Poised Out
D. W. Critch, president of the Loyal Legion, in putting the proposition before the members, pointed out the real opportunity for the organization to be of lasting service to the community, and the fact was expressed that such a project would give the town an added impetus to build for progress and prosperity by providing a common goal for all to strive toward.

E. C. Eskman, mayor of the city; Oswald Olson, president of the American Legion, and other prominent residents of the city are declared to be highly in favor of the project, and definite plans are expected to be presented in the near future.

The city now has a park, the hill near Williamette Heights, and this is provided with a road that leads to the top. An excellent view of the city can be obtained from there, but the site is suitable for a playground or athletic field.

Years ago a huge sign, the word "Springfield," was built on the side of the hill facing the main line of the Southern Pacific, but this has since been torn down.

The Loyal Legion committee will bring in a report at the next regular meeting, and it is thought that other committees will be at work at this time also.

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COUNTY UNIT'S SESSION

AT CRESWELL IS LIVELY

Seventeen Locals Are Represented at Meeting

SHERIFF OFFICE SCORED

Resolutions Call on Tax Collecting Department to Segregate the Tax Money Promptly

(Register Lane County Special)
CRESWELL, Ore., June 23.—A meeting of the county unit of the Farmers' union was held at Creswell today for an all-day session. Seventeen of the member locals began to come and the day showed an attendance of over three hundred. The sessions were held in the local unit were not large enough to accommodate the crowd. The day was devoted to discussions of vital interest to farmers and as most of them were held behind closed doors, the details cannot be given but the subject of taxation was the principal subject that attracted the members to this meeting.

The meeting opened promptly at ten o'clock with County President Ralph P. Laird, of Mount Vernon local, in the chair and C. E. Jordan, of Pleasant Hill, second. The report of County Organizer Harry C. Jackson, of Springfield, showed two new locals organized in May and two new ones in June, showing a total membership of 1,000, the county of over eleven hundred.

Tax Problem Interests Farmers
The organizer reported that the subjects the farmers seemed generally interested in were tax problem principally with reference to the income tax measure. A communication from the American Legion of Eugene, inviting participation in the Fourth of July celebration was left to each individual local to decide whether it would enter the parade, the county organization not taking it up. The next county meeting will be held at Cottage Grove on call of the board.

A dinner provided by the resident locals generally and replenished by all who came was served in the hardware building where over two hundred subjects were seated with a bountiful dinner.

The afternoon session opened at one with an open meeting and literary program. Music was furnished by E. Harding, Miss Mary Harding, Miss Edith Hunter, Miss Edith H. Hunter, Miss Edna Zinniker and Miss Nita Zinniker in quartet selections, tries and duets all of which were most entertaining and enthusiastically received. C. E. Cooley also gave a musical number.

Readings were given by J. W. Hyett, cashier of the Creswell Fruit Growers' bank, and Mrs. Fanny Morris; Alma Grousebeck spoke a piece. County Assessor Herbert Walker, of Eugene, gave an address on taxation, telling of the methods pursued in making assessments and he recommended the graduating income tax measure.

In closed session the business of the organization was resumed. E. E. Morrison, of Eugene, manager of the Farmer's Unit Warehouse company, gave the details of warehousing, buying and selling farm products and covered the subject thoroughly, pointing out the proper policy of the organization in carrying its industry. The work of the county organizer was ordered continued. Among several resolutions offered and adopted the following may be deemed the most important.

Would Probe Bond Funds.
A resolution was adopted to the effect that the expenditures of the county funds for market road purposes be investigated and a committee was appointed for that purpose. Another resolution was passed as follows:

Whereas, for the past three or four years much delay has been occasioned by the failure on the part of the tax collecting department of Lane county to segregate the tax money after it is paid in the treasury, and many school warrants are drawing interest at the rate of six per cent when the money to pay said warrants is in the tax collectors hands, be it Resolved, that it is the sense of this body that the sheriff's office be urged to make the segregation of the tax money as soon as possible so that it may be paid to the county treasurer for the purpose of liquidating the outstanding school warrants.

Whereas, the school warrants which have been voted by the taxpayers.

Hon. H. C. Wheeler, representative from Lane county, was present and gave a talk on the graduated income tax measure and his talk was followed with a resolution unanimously passed that Lane County Unit Farmers' union go on record as being in favor of the income tax measure as passed by the last session of the legislature.

The interest in the meetings prolonged the session until after five o'clock and all proclaimed the day one of the most successful in the history of the county union.
