ROAD CAMP IS MOVED GREENWOOD AND DANN MAKE PROGRESS ON JOB

Greenwood and Dann, the contractors on the territorial highway between Chehalis and the Benton county line, have moved their camp during the past few days to about half way between the two points named and are making good headway with the grading, according to L. N. Honey, county commissioner. He said that the contractors will finish grading in six weeks if they continue at the present rate and the rock will be spread on the first two miles within a week or so.

The commissioner said that the county is about ready to spread rock on the high pass road just

west of Bear Creek station where grading is now under way under the direction of Walter Campbell, road supervisor in the district between Eastern Creek and Junction City, who was transferred to this job. Both Commissioners Honey and Sharp express gratification at the speed with which the work is progressing.

PLANS ARE READY FOR JULY 4 CELEBRATION HERE

That the business district of Eugene will be appropriately decorated for the July 4 celebration to be staged here under the direction of Lane county post of the American Legion is the assurance of the post committee in charge of the event, and plans are being completed for the stringing of colored lights across Willamette street from Seventh and Tenth avenues. Stringing of pennants will also be provided for the street decoration and local merchants will also cooperate in the plan by the dressing up of their buildings and windows for the event, is the announcement.

REALTORS GO TO MEETING THOUSAND EXPECTED TO ATTEND PORTLAND MEET

Eugene Will Be Represented by Strong Group, Says President McCully of Local Board

Fully one thousand realtors from all parts of the Pacific Northwest and British Columbia will be in attendance at the annual convention of the Northwest real estate convention at Portland July 8, 19, 20, according to R. A. McCully, president of the local board.

Indications are that Eugene will be represented by a strong group, as a number of the local realtors are planning on going and they would like to urge the attendance of the entire board, if possible, as they have a chance to make a good showing at this convention, said Mr. McCully.

This year's convention will be particularly notable for the reason that the Northwest realtors will entertain W. L. Eppich, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, and in addition William Herron, national field secretary, and Arthur T. Nelson, national executive secretary, may be present.

In a letter just received by Mr. McCully from Harry Beckwith, president of the Portland Real Estate board, it is stated the convention this year will come to a final decision on the multiple listing system, under which property can be sold by any realtor if listed with one.

"The convention also will discuss problems in connection with acquiring the public with the fact that only members of the realty boards are 'realtors' and that buyers and sellers of property are under the protection of the realty boards only when their agents are realtors in good standing with the association," said Mr. McCully.

ALL CROPS LOOK FINE SUCH WEATHER AS THIS MAKES FARMERS HAPPY

"I have never seen the farm crops looking any better than they are now," said E. M. Warren, who lives 11 miles west of the city, and who has been here since 1884. "This is ideal weather for all kinds of grain and for fruit trees. A year ago at this time my pear trees acted as if they were going to die and prunes and everything else looked bad; but this year every tree I have on my place looks healthy and is growing rapidly, all due to the rains we have had this spring and summer."

"Some people say that out soil is worn out," said Mr. Warren, "but this is not a fact. Our land is still rich and all we need is moisture like we had this year. If we could only have such weather as we have had every spring and summer this valley would be a paradise."

Mr. Warren said that a year ago he and many other farmers were complaining of the dryness which have appeared in large numbers west of Corvallis and in at least one part of Lane county, but this year he said he has seen only one tent of them in his trees.
