Report Expected Soon

Mayor Parks said that a report from Engineer Thompson, of Seattle, who has been employed by the council to make a survey of the Amazon district, will soon be made and he advised that action be postponed until these figures are submitted. Engineer Thompson has submitted three different methods of draining the stream. The mayor said that when this report is made all plans will be considered and some action will be taken.

Attorney Smith in presenting his plea declared that something should be done during the dry season when the work could be carried on.

J. E. Shelton appeared before the council in behalf of Guy and Elaine Harvey, asking that the order to raise some old buildings owned by them on Eighth avenue west between Olive and Charleston streets be rescinded or that the order be enforced. He said that it is not fair to compel one owner to tear his buildings down and to allow others to stand. Councilman Williams, chairman of the health committee, stated that he was not yet ready to report on the Klamm building which was referred to him at the last meeting and no action was taken on Mr. Shelton's petition.

The chief of police reported that he had examined H. L. Studley's old building on Monroe street between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues west and said that a little work had been done on it but that he would recommend that the council take action against the owner if he did not do more during the next few weeks than he has done during the past few.

City May Have New Barn

When the application of W. J. Williams for an advance in the rental of his barn on Lincoln street used by the city, from \$15 to \$25 a month was read, the matter of the city's owning a barn of its own was brought up and Councilman Monroe moved that the engineer and building inspector be instructed to make an estimate of the cost of such a structure to be put up on the city's property adjoining the barn now rented. This motion seemed to meet with popular favor and was readily carried.

FAR WEST PLANS MADE

ARCHITECT TO OUTLINE
BUILDING ARRANGEMENT

F. L. Chambers, in Company With
W. R. B. Wilcox, Will Inspect
Albany Plant Machinery

To inspect the mechanical equipment of the Far West Manufacturing company and outline plans for the new building that will house the organization here, F. L. Chambers, member of the board of directors, will go to Albany today in company with W. R. B. Wilcox, architect, who will obtain data on the space required and other details concerning the floor space and facilities needed for the operation of the plant in this city. The site for the plant here has not yet been announced, members of the board of directors stating that three possible locations are under consideration and that in the near future an announcement will be made.

The entire issue of \$45,000 in common stock has been practically subscribed and the first installment is being called in according to reports. The original plan of floating \$50,000 in common stock and a note issue of \$15,000 has been changed. Under the new plan the capital stock is increased from \$50,000 to \$75,000 to admit of the extra issue of \$15,000 common stock to be sold and leaving a margin for a later issue of \$10,000 when needed. \$30,000 of this amount will be held by the original stockholders and \$45,000 by the subscribers and the new stockholders of the company, making a total of \$15,000 common stock issued. This new arrangement will put all interested in the company on an equal footing and bring the new plant to Eugene free from encumbrance, is the report of the directors.
