STOLEN TIRES ON MARK BROOM'S AUTOMOBILE

Two Owned By T. H. Garrett
Positively Identified

ACCUSED EVADES ARREST

Officers Have Not Yet Located
McKenzie Valley Man Indicted
By Grand Jury

The mystery of the disappearance of all four tires, a spot light, a set of tools and other fixtures from T. H. Garrett's automobile, which was stolen on the night of March 22 and taken to a point near High Banks, on the McKenzie above Springfield, and stripped, was partially solved yesterday when two of the tires were found on an automobile owned by Mark Broom, alleged moonshiner, whose arrest the officers have been trying to effect for a long time. Mrs. Broom drove the car to the city and placed it in a garage for repairs. The tires were positively identified by Mr. Garrett, who has a record of their numbers, and he said he thought it quite certain that some of the tools found in the car were his.

Broom's Home Searched
Sheriff Rickels yesterday, after the tires had been identified, sent Deputy Rodney Roach to Broom's home, near Hendricks bridge, in an endeavor to locate the other tires and fixtures stolen off the car, but

nothing was found. No one was at home except Broom's aged mother who vehemently declared that Mark may be accused of moonshining, but no one could accuse him of stealing.

Broom has been indicted as being the principal operator of the huge moonshine still confiscated by the officers near Hendricks bridge several weeks ago, but he cannot be located by the officers. Reports have reached the office of Sheriff Rickels that he has left the state. The sheriff has received information that just prior to the finding of the still near Hendricks bridge Broom was arrested at Reedport for moonshining, that he surrendered his still and was fined \$300.

Hart Brothers Indicted

John and Albert Hart, of Hendricks bridge, have been indicted on a charge of operating the still at Hendricks bridge and are out on bail. They refuse to divulge any information as to the whereabouts of Broom, if they know, and also declare that they were never associated with him in any kind of a business enterprise.

The possession of the two tires owned by T. H. Garrett probably is sufficient evidence to warrant the prosecution of Broom on a charge of larceny, should the still ownership charge fail, declare the officers. They hope to locate the other two tires, the tools and the spot light.

NURSES NAME OFFICERS OF STATE ASSOCIATION

Miss Grace Phelps Re-elected
as President

U. OF O. CLASS DISCUSSED

Forty-Four Members of Oregon
Organization Representing 26
Training Schools Are Here

With the election of officers for the coming year the annual session of the Oregon State Graduate Nurses' association was closed yesterday afternoon after a full day of business activity and talks by officials of the organization and representatives of the medical profession and the University of Oregon. The new officers elected are all from Portland. The following will serve next year: Miss Grace Phelps, president; Miss Ann Schneider, vice-president; Miss Margaret A. Tynon, secretary, and Mrs. Edith Rosewell, treasurer. An executive board of three members was also named. The following is the board: Mrs. Darwin L. Palmer, Miss Anna Slagle and Miss Elizabeth Beach.

The place of meeting next year was not decided upon but will be discussed at a meeting of the officials later in the year. An invitation from the Salem delegation to hold the annual session there was received and will be taken under consideration according to announcement. At the noon luncheon held at Anchorage 44 graduate nurses, members of the Oregon association were present and responded to the call of the presiding officer by telling the gathering the name of their training school. Twenty-six training schools in various parts of the United States were represented by graduates at the luncheon.

U. of O. Course Is Topic

Dr. H. B. Yocum of the University of Oregon school of medicine was one of the principal speakers on the afternoon program. Dr. Yocum explained the pre-nursing courses that are to be held by the University of Oregon next year. These courses which are a new feature of the medical program of the state institution are to be listed in the catalog for the next collegiate year. Dr. A. H. Ross, president of the Lane County Medical association, was also a speaker during the afternoon business session.

Reports on the state organization for the past year show a total paid up membership of almost 300

graduate nurses. The state is divided into five districts. The Lane county association, organized April 11 last year, is number 5. This is the first time that the state organization has held its annual meeting outside of Portland and the many delegates present expressed their appreciation of the arrangements that had been made for the visitors under the direction of the Lane county association officials.

Visitors Are Greeted

Mrs. L. E. Bean, president of the Eugene Federation of Women's clubs, welcomed the visiting nurses on behalf of the organization and told of the co-operation of the various units that are affiliated with the federation. The Lane county association at its last meeting voted to affiliate with the Eugene federation. Mayor E. B. Parks also addressed the delegates on behalf of the city of Eugene.

Mrs. Cora Zimmerman, president of the Lane County Nurses' association, also greeted the visitors. Miss Grace Phelps, re-elected president of the state organization, spoke on the aims and ideals of the association and the prerequisites in the way of educational training for those who plan to follow professional nursing as a career. Others who spoke were Harriet Thompson of the physical education school of the University of Oregon; Grace Holmes, president of the League of Nursing Education; Edith Duke, who spoke on "Private Duty Nursing," and Miss Margaret A. Tynon, who talked on hospital record keeping. Annie Hunter and Laura Campbell, members of the association, entertained with piano selections and vocal presentations during the session.

FIVE DIVORCES GRANTED

CRUEL TREATMENT AND DEGRADATION ARE ALLEGATIONS

One New Case Filed in Which Wife
Claims Husband Makes
Cutting Remarks

One new divorce case was filed and five decrees granted in circuit court yesterday.

Mrs. Lillian F. Briggs is plaintiff in a suit instituted against E. E. Briggs, a Southern Pacific trainman. They were married at Grants Pass April 15, 1914 and have two minor children. Mrs. Briggs testified that her husband made cutting and sarcastic remarks to her and that he has totally disregarded her feelings in all things. She asks for the care and custody of the children, and that her husband be compelled to give her \$150 suit money and \$75 a month for the support of herself and children pending the suit. Whitten Swafford is her attorney in the case.

Mrs. Clara Coy was given a decree from David Lewis Coy on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. Mrs. Coy says her husband accused her of having intimate relations with other men and that he was cross, crabbed, and cruel. She further stated that while she was visiting at her mother's home her husband sold all of their household goods and disappeared. She was given the care and custody of their children. They were married in Eugene March 30, 1921.

Frank V. Bounds was given a divorce from Orrel M. Bounds. They were married in Portland February 10, 1919, and Bounds alleged that his wife deserted him.

Alta A. Taylor was given her freedom from Harvey A. Taylor. She testified that her husband was cross, crabbed and cruel and that he choked her. She was given the care and custody of the child. They were married in Nebraska February 21, 1919.

Mertie M. Kayser was given her decree from Ole J. Kayser on the ground of desertion.

Leah Cobb was freed from J. O. Cobb. They were married in Portland December 11, 1922. Mrs. Cobb testified that her husband has refused to work, that he spends her money and that he has compelled her to live in a house little better than a corn crib. Mrs. Cobb was given the care and custody of their child.

SUMMER SCHOOL OPENS

ANNUAL SESSION AT UNIVERSITY CONVENES TODAY

Number of Outside Professors in
Addition to Members of
Faculty Will Teach

Summer school at the university begins today for its six weeks session from June 27 to August 4. A large number of university students have remained in Eugene to attend the session and many from outside are expected. Special emphasis will be placed on advanced and graduate work this summer and courses especially designed for teachers and principals of public schools are attracting public school teachers throughout the state.

Regular members of the university faculty will be assisted by a number of visiting professors. Among visiting professors are William J. Cooper, superintendent of schools of Fresno, California, who will offer courses in the education department; Dr. O. C. Johnson, assistant director of the bureau of educational research of St. Paul, who will be in the education department also, and Dr. Charles H. Whitman, head of the department of English at Rutgers college.

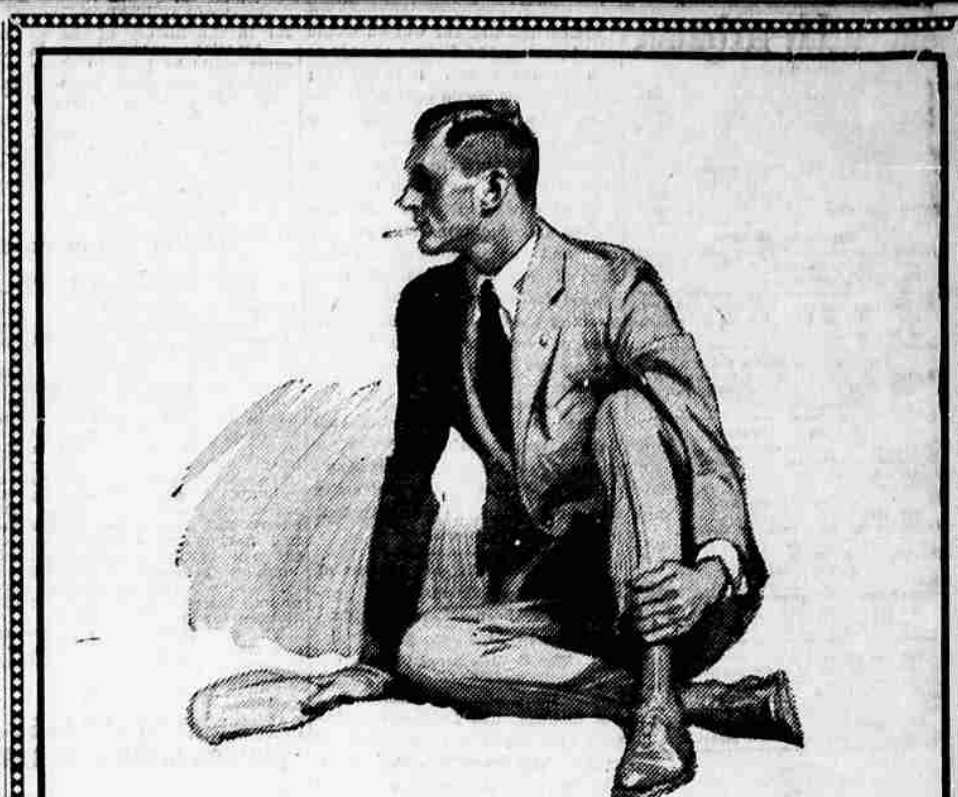
