

HOTEL IMPROVEMENTS TO BE STARTED AT ONCE

Permit Taken Out By Hoffman House Manager

\$25,000 TO BE EXPENDED

Lumber and Other Materials Already Being Delivered on Ground for Fourth Story

Work of remodeling the building and adding a fourth story to the Hoffman hotel will start at once, according to George L. Hoffman, manager of the hotel. Some of the lumber is already on the ground and other materials are being delivered. A permit for the expenditure of \$25,000 on the improvement.

The addition of the fourth story will add 20 rooms to the hotel, making 60 in all and will provide a lobby and office on the first floor, where the law office of Williams and Dean and a jewelry and coal office are now located. For many years, when the old Hoffman was the leading hotel in Eugene, the lobby was located on the corner where Mrs. Gilmore's women's shop is now doing business, but during the past few years the office has been conducted on the second floor and there has been no lobby. No dining room has been operated by the hotel for a long time. The old dining room was located where the law office, jewelry office and the White lunch restaurant are now.

The fourth story will be of hollow tile construction. The architect, John Hunsicker, who is furnishing the plans, says that this material, which is much lighter than brick, will not make the four stories too heavy for the present foundation.

Steinmetz Bros., bakers, who recently bought the Mountain States power company's building at 257 Willamette street, took out a permit yesterday to remodel the second floor of the structure at a cost of \$500.

THINNING DEMONSTRATED

PROFESSOR LONG SHOWS FRUIT MEN BEST METHODS

Many fruit growers attended the apple and pear thinning demonstration at Alvarado Tuesday afternoon and quite a crowd attended the demonstration at the Russell orchard on River avenue earlier in the day, according to A. C. Dickenson, night clerk at the Hotel Chicago, who owns an orchard at Alvarado.

Professor Clayton C. Long, of the state college at Corvallis, conducted the demonstration, assisted by C. L. Stewart, county fruit inspector.

Mr. Dickenson says that the orchards in the Alvarado district that have been cared for are looking fine and the apple and pear trees are all loaded. The crop is very heavy and if the price is good this year the orchardists of that locality will do well, he said.

AVIATORS LAND IN STORM

BRETT AND GOLDSBOROUGH HAVE THRILL AT MEDFORD

When Major George Brett and Lieutenant W. C. Goldsborough of Crimsey field, San Francisco, who are now in Eugene with their De Havilland plane, landed at Medford on the way north Monday a severe electrical and wind storm was raging there, but the officers said they were above the storm most of the time and entered the rain only a minute or two before landing. The wind did not seem to affect the landing, which was made without mishap.

DAVIS DEMANDS REFORMS

SECRETARY MOVES IN BELIEF OF DEFENDENTS

AURORA, Ill., June 26. — Sweeping reforms in the present system of the care of dependent persons was demanded by James J. Davis, secretary of labor, in his annual report submitted today to the convention of the Loyal Order of Moose at Mooseheart, in his capacity as director general of the order.

Secretary Davis excoriated the administration of public charity in many of the poor houses and orphan asylums.

Instead of each county in a state having its own poor house, he said, there should not be more than one or two centralized institutions in a state where wholly adequate facilities would be provided.

ROAD COMMISSION ALLOWS FOR ROOSEVELT WORK

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25. — The state highway commission at a meeting here today allowed Coos county a credit of \$119,000 for money expended on the Roosevelt highway north of North Bend. When the state takes up the completion of the link in this road between North Bend and Houser, this amount of state funds will be expended on the work.

Definite location of the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway near Myrtle Point was decided on by the selection of the route along the east side of the river. Bids were opened for several new roads improvement projects.

SCOUT LEADERS IN CAMP

WINONA SPRINGS, Ore., June 24. — (Special to the Register.) The first leaders' camp of Girl Scouts in Oregon has been in full swing at this place since last Friday and the girls are very much in possession of the place, as the continued wet weather of recent weeks has prevented the usual influx of summer visitors at this resort thus far on account of the condition of the road from Oakridge, which will be fairly passable, however, with a week of dry weather. There are 15 in this party of leaders, who are organized for business and pleasure under the direction of Mrs. Daisy Stewart, of Tacoma, director of the Girl Scouts for the Northwest, assisted by Mrs. Bruce Horsfall, of Portland, and Miss Vera Todd, of Eugene.

The party arrived here Friday evening in two trucks laden with girls, baggage and supplies, after a trip made partly in the dark over the mountain road from Oakridge, which held a few thrills for some of the party unaccustomed to this kind of traveling. After supper at the hotel and an hour of singing and jollification the party sought its quarters in one of the larger cottages, supplemented by a sleeping tent. As to the tent, a brand new one, there hangs another tale. For the adventures of the night held a sudden mountain shower which dripped and sprayed through the canvas, driving eight madmen out in the chill gray dawn, drenched in person and spirit. However, as the morning dawned, the camp was placed a pair of cottages at the disposal of the party and wet weather conditions no longer dismayed and all is serene. Pioneer Leaders' Camp, as it has been christened.

The organization of the camp into three patrols was made on board the train and the business of camp keeping, according to scout law, was divided among these patrols. The days were roughly portioned off with forenoon for instruction and most of the afternoon devoted to pleasure in which an hour in the big swimming pool holds great attraction. PLANES RE-FUELING IN AIR IS ACCOMPLISHED

ARMY FLIERS TO MAKE NEW START FOR RECORD TODAY

Burned-out Generator Forces Landing in First Trial—Four Days, Four Nights Is Aim

SAN DIEGO, June 27. — Forced to descend today after less than six hours in the air, but having accomplished the notable feat of refueling twice in mid-air, Captain Lowell H. Smith and Lieutenant John B. Richter, army aviators, are going to start again tomorrow morning in another effort to set the aviation record for which their flight was intended. The postponement became necessary when a burned-out generator made them bring their big De Havilland plane to the ground after five hours and 41 minutes. Hardly had the machine alighted before the two officers were in consultation with Major Henry Arnold, commanding Rockwell field, and a new start planned for the flight, which it is hoped to continue for four days and four nights.

The second attempt is scheduled to begin about 4:30 A. M. tomorrow morning.

EUROPE LABOR RADICAL

AMERICAN UNIONS FROWN ON RED TENDENCIES

WASHINGTON, June 26. — European trade unionism is evincing strongly radical tendencies, according to a review of labor conditions abroad issued today by the American Federation of Labor. One symptom was said to be an amputation of the international transport workers federation with an organization of similarly engaged workers in Russia. A second was said to be instructed by the Soviet of British delegates to a recent labor congress at Hamburg to vote of resolutions of rebuke of the Russian soviet government for its persecution of socialists.

"European trade unionism is at present in no essential manner recovering from the onslaught of communism," the report said. "It is on the contrary, the movement making some important surrenders, the consequences of which are not easy to see in their entirety at present."

"American labor will not only not join the movement of bolshevism but it will raise its voice to protest at every sign of compromise with the institution, no matter where that attempt will be made."

NEW WEAPON IS DEADLY

SHOULDER RIFLE FIRES SIXTY SHOTS PER MINUTE

WASHINGTON, June 27. — Every doubt may be practically a machine gunner in future wars due to progress made by ordinance experts in developing a semi-automatic shoulder rifle to replace the regular service magazine guns.

Recent demonstration firing with the latest post-war model, the Garand semi-automatic, grounds, has convinced many officers that they are on the road to the long sought solution of the proper weapon for the infantry.

The Garand developed a speed of sixty shots a minute during the firing at Aberdeen.

In many respects, the new gun is an exact reproduction of the 1903 Springfield and is lighter than

the modern Enfield, produced in quantity during the war.
