

MILLION DOLLAR LUMBER PLANT TO BE OPERATED

Alsea River Company's Saws Will Be Started Up

STOCKHOLDERS ACT

Fischer, Receiver, Authorized to Go Ahead with Operations in Near Future

The million dollar plant of the Alsea River Lumber company of this city, located at Glenbrook, in Alsea county, will be in operation within a few weeks, according to an announcement yesterday by Harry Fischer, receiver, who arrived home Wednesday night from New York, where he conferred with the principal stockholders, who authorized him to place the plant in operation.

While the mill has a normal capacity of 50,000 feet of lumber per day, it will be operated so as to produce about 75,000 or perhaps 100,000 daily, said Mr. Fischer, but later all the saws may be operated.

The company a short time ago had its big tract of timber adjacent to the mill through forec-

ure of contract, as it was unable to produce \$440,000 due June 1 as one of the payments, but it has some timber left and Mr. Fischer said that this will be enough to keep the plant in operation for some time. Mr. Fischer, as receiver, has been in personal charge of the plant since his appointment and he has kept a force of men there as watchmen and to keep the machinery from deteriorating.

The exact date of the beginning of operations was not announced by Mr. Fischer. A crew of men will be put to work immediately getting the plant in shape and it will not be any weeks before the hum of the saws will be heard, he said.

SUMMER REGISTRATION REACHES NEARLY 800

Nearly One Hundred Graduates on Oregon Campus

CONFERENCE ON TODAY

Educators to Discuss Administrative and Teaching Problems in Two-Day Session

An enrollment of approximately 800 in the Eugene and Portland sections of the University of Oregon summer session is indicated in figures made up by Earl Kilpatrick, director of the extension division, for the Portland center, and Carlton Spencer, registrar on the campus. A feature of the campus registration is the presence between 75 and 100 graduate students, here to take advanced work.

Interest on the campus today will center around the annual educational conference, which will open with the assembly in Villard hall at 11 o'clock and run through Friday and Saturday afternoons. With the exception of the assembly, the sessions will be held in the administration building, Guild hall or if that is in use by classes in the drama, in Condon hall.

Superintendents on Program
At the educational conference, problems affecting teaching and school management are discussed by Oregon schoolmen and by outside educational experts. On the program this year are Superintendent W. J. Cooper of the schools of Fresno, Cal., and Dr. G. J. Johnson, assistant director of the bureau of educational research, St. Paul.

The assembly today will be addressed by President Campbell on the subject "The Next Ten Years in Education." The assembly yesterday was of a musical nature, with a program rendered by Jean Steed, Wanda Eastwood and Arthur Hicks, pianists; Rita Durkheimer, soprano, and Alberta Potter, violinist, with Mrs. Aurora Potter Underwood, accompanist.

The first social event of the summer session will be the reception given in alumni hall, woman's building, tonight, under the direction of Mrs. Clara Lynn Fitch, secretary of the summer session.

TWO YOUTHS ROB STORE

INMATES OF FEEBLE-MINDED SCHOOL ARRESTED

Admit Entering Place of H. L. Mooney in West Springfield and Taking Goods and Corn

H. L. Mooney's store at West Springfield was robbed about 12 o'clock Wednesday night by two feeble-minded youths, one of whom was arrested by Sheriff Green Pitcher at Cottage Grove and the other by Sheriff Stickels at Portland. Both about 18 years old and inmates of the state feeble-minded school at Salem, they are now back in that institution, having been arrested a few hours after the crime was committed.

According to their own confession the boys entered the store by tearing a hole in the screen door of the store. The proprietor slept only a few yards away and when the door of his house opened, he said he heard nothing. He said that he usually hears any one who steps on the porch of the store and always awakens when anyone drives up to his filling station nearby. But these boys must have worked very quietly, as Mr. Mooney says he did not hear a sound and the watchdog that usually sets up a noise when anyone is prowling around did not let out a whimper.

About \$8 worth of cigarettes, tobacco, soap and chewing gum and about the same amount in cash were taken. Mr. Mooney has recovered most of the goods and \$6.35 of the money. The rest of it the boys say they spent.

Gould and Crawford were picked up on the streets here Wednesday by Chief of Police Judkins. They said they wanted work and the chief turned them over to Colonel J. J. Harbaugh, juvenile officer, who sent them to John Thramer, orchardist, across the river. He gave them a job of picking cherries and they worked a few hours, drew their pay and quit. They were afterwards seen along the highway between the city and West Springfield.

Yesterday morning these boys appeared at the store of H. Owens at Goshen and bought a few articles. As they appeared to have nothing but small change Owens suspected that they had robbed a store somewhere, but had not heard of the West Springfield burglary. He telephoned to Deputy Sheriff Green Pitcher at Cottage Grove and Pitcher telephoned to Sheriff Stickels. The sheriff had been notified of the Mooney robbery and sent Deputies Van Svarverud and Rodney Roach to look for Gould and Crawford. They were overtaken between Goshen and Crowell and the goods stolen in the store were found in their possession.

An official of the feeble-minded school arrived in an early afternoon train and took the boys back to Salem.

EARWIGS TRAVEL SOUTH

EUROPEAN PEST APPEARS AS FAR AS ROSEBURG

Assistant County Agent Discovers Bugs Thought to Have Been Brought by Tourists

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 28.—The European earwig, a serious insect pest which has been causing considerable trouble in Portland, Salem and Albany in recent months, is in Roseburg in sufficient numbers to be a source of real concern. It was discovered this morning by W. R. Carpenter, assistant county agent. It is not known yet how extensive the infestation of this insect pest has become in Douglas county, or what steps may be necessary to control them.

NEW TRIAL MOTION FILED

FORMAL ACTION TAKEN IN MOXLEY RAPE CASE

Case of Fred Baker Against E. D. Paine and J. H. Barr to Be Dismissed on Stipulation

Motion for new trial in the case of state against Earl B. Moxley, Creswell farmer, who was convicted a few days ago of the charge of rape, was filed in circuit court yesterday by Moxley's attorneys, Potter, Foster and Immel. The grounds for which they seek a new trial, as alleged by the attorneys, are that there was insufficient evidence to prove the crime charged and that errors of law occurred at the trial and were duly excepted to by the defendant.

In the case of Fred Baker against E. D. Paine and J. H. Barr stipulation for dismissal was filed yesterday as it has been compromised and settled. James G. Wells yesterday instituted suit in circuit court against Alf Holm and Nels Holm, seeking a judgment in the sum of \$101.75, alleged due the San Juan Packing company with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from April 4, 1923, and the further sum of \$10 with the same rate of interest from the same date. Wells and Wells are attorneys for the plaintiff.

MILL OUTPUT STILL HIGH

PRODUCTION 27 PER CENT ABOVE NORMAL

One hundred and thirty mills reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending June 23, manufactured 112,757,008 feet of lumber; sold 99,929,826 feet; and shipped 112,228,929 feet, says the weekly report of the association.

Production for reporting mills was 27 per cent above normal. New business was 19 per cent below production. Shipments were 23 per cent above new business. Thirty-eight per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 34,207,563 feet, of which 21,079,843 feet was for domestic cargo delivery; and 13,128,740 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 1729 cars.

Forty-one per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 45,966,706 feet, of which 29,410,405 feet moved coastwise and intercoastal; and 16,556,301 feet overseas. Rail shipments totaled 2947 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 4,852,223 feet. Filled domestic cargo orders total 148,278,379 feet. Unfilled export orders, 44,227,219 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders, 6895 cars. In the first 25 weeks of the year, production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 2,484,355,803 feet; new business 2,590,652,902 feet; and shipments 2,736,035,915 feet.

NEW MACHINERY ADDED

FISCHER LUMBER COMPANY MAKES IMPROVEMENTS

The Fischer Lumber company of Marcola has just installed in its logging camp back of that place a new two-speed donkey engine of the most modern type, built by the Washington Iron works of Seattle, according to Fred Fischer, one of the members of the company, who was here yesterday. The company has also installed a new band saw at the planing mill and is making other improvements.

Jack Harriman, Exiled, Is Making Good

Young Jack Harriman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Harriman, multi-millionaire leaders of New York society, married Alice Laidley, dancing girl and artist's model, on August 12, 1922. She had been raised almost as a ward of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Chandler Christy. Young Harriman was told by his family he would have to "make good on his own." With an allowance from his father of only \$200 a month, he and his bride are living happily in the little railroad town of Jackson, Tenn., where he is learning the railroad business from the ground up.

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The earwigs discovered here this morning were found in greatest abundance in the immediate vicinity of the camp grounds in North Roseburg, and it is believed that they have been carried there by the tourists and are spreading from that point. Those property owners adjacent to the camp grounds should be continually on the lookout because the municipal camp grounds in Portland are heavily infested and these insects might easily be transferred by the travelers coming from the metropolis.

The earwig is a pest of considerable importance and a potential menace to many crops should it once get into the fruit growing section. The insect works particularly in shrubbery and flowers, but is not at all backward about coming into the house to hide in clothes and closets or in the cookie jar or the pantry shelves. Because of the fact that they have little preference about their habitat they are extremely filthy and carry this filth throughout the house, into food and beds and elsewhere. Their presence is most obnoxious and annoying and so far that is the greatest damage accredited to them here.

The earwig is a small brown insect, between a quarter and an inch in length. The males are the larger and their bodies are rounder with long curved pinchers behind. The females have shorter, straight pinchers.

It is not believed that the earwig situation is serious here at present. The insects hide during the daylight and are not seen unless a person makes a careful search for them. They are most apt to be found in rose buds or other flower buds and if a person shakes the bush they will drop off and disappear quickly. They are very quick and fast in their movements and are consequently not frequently seen.

The county agent is immediately taking up the matter with the state board of horticulture which is conducting the campaign against these pests in other localities and is asking for advice in handling the situation here. Persons who find earwigs anywhere will render a real service in this matter by reporting the case to the county agent's office without delay.

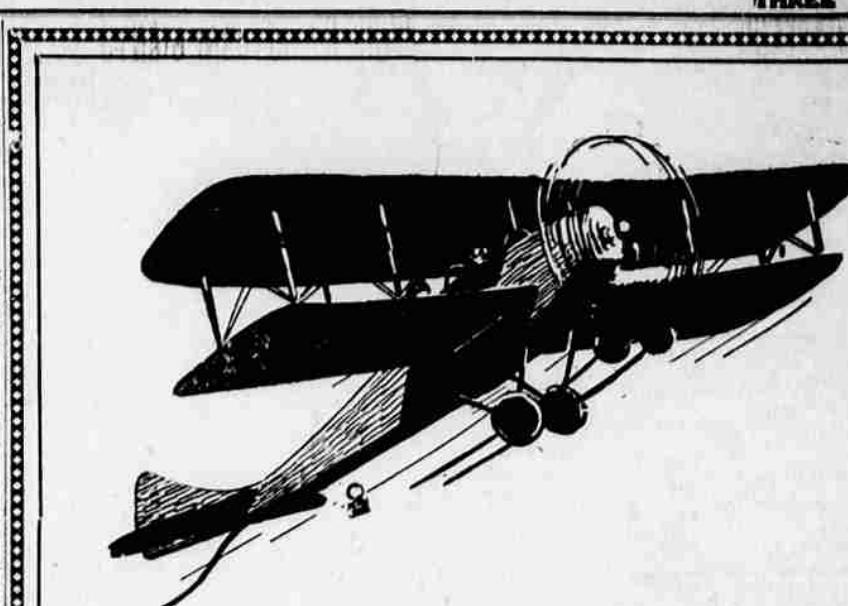
Y' FAOLIC IS SUCCESS
