

TIMBER COMPANY SEEKS TO CANCEL ROAD TAXES

Starret and Hovey Begin Injunction Proceedings

LEVY IS HELD ILLEGAL

Law Not Complied with in Six Districts in Western Lane Is Allegation

Suit to enjoin the collection of the special road taxes in six different road districts in the western part of Lane county yesterday by Starret and Hovey, of Detroit, Mich., who own large tracts of timber lands in Lane county. They allege in their complaint, filed by their attorneys, Williams and Bean, that the proposed tax levies for road purposes were not made in a legal manner and that the levies are null and void.

This firm refused to pay the first half of the special road taxes in these districts when it became due but paid the half of their general tax and school tax on these lands.

This is not the first large firm that has contested the special road taxes in western Lane. A number of weeks ago the Bouslaw Timber company filed a similar suit and this was followed by a statement from county officials that practically all of the special road levies made in these outlying districts were perhaps illegal. It is claimed

that the procedure provided by law was not followed in making the levies.

The suit is entitled Horatio N. Hovey and T. C. Starret against Lane county and Fred G. Buckels, sheriff and tax collector, and the districts in which it is sought to restrain the collection of the special taxes are No. 6, where there is a five-mill levy; No. 39, where four mills were levied; No. 39, five mills; No. 56, five mills; No. 66, five mills; and No. 83, five mills.

The plaintiffs pray that the defendants be restrained from collecting the road taxes and that they be cancelled.

The total number of acres of land owned by this firm in these districts is 14,929 and the special road taxes on the lands amount to over \$1000, according to tax deposition in the office of Sheriff Buckels.

The complaint states that the firm owns 2755 acres in district No. 6, 787 acres in No. 3, 3567 acres in No. 39, 4402 acres in No. 56, 2268 acres in No. 66 and 169 acres in No. 83.

LOCH GOIL GROG SECURE

BRITISH CRAFT IN PORTLAND SAILED BEFORE JUNE 10

PORTLAND, June 29.—Any liquor on board the good ship Loch Goil—and there admittedly is some on board, will remain intact behind the British government seals while the vessel lies at her berth in Portland, it was announced today by E. C. McFarland, collector of Customs.

The Loch Goil, British motorship, sailed from the port before June 10, the date of the seizure orders of the United States government, and all of her cargo that will be taken off at Portland is in cement, 150 tons of Australian fleece and general merchandise.

The vessel, operated by the Luckenbach line, berthed at the Montgomery dock here last night and will load with bulk grain.

DR. PRICE REPUDIATED

ALBANY BAPTISTS NOT IN ACCORD WITH DOCTRINES

Teachings of Healing Evangelist Are in Conflict with Bible, Deacons Maintain

ALBANY, Ore., June 29.—Local religious circles were given a subject for wide discussion Sunday morning when announcement was made by Dr. B. P. Fellman from the pulpit to the effect that the officers of the First Baptist church are no longer in accord with such interpretations of the scripture as were propounded by Dr. Charles Price, evangelist, in Albany last November.

Also yesterday members of the church received printed announcements of this stand, authorized and issued by the pastor and deacons of the church, explaining the stand taken by the Baptist church leaders of Albany and suggesting that those who find their position now untenable may withdraw from the Baptist church here and affiliate with other denominations more adaptable to their beliefs.

Fellman gives views. Accompanying the printed letter was a tract written by Rev. Fellman and issued under the sanction of Dr. W. B. Hinson, of Portland, and the state Baptist organization. The tract explains more fully the Baptist view of the doctrines that were expounded by Dr. Price in Albany, and of similar quotations covered generally by the term, "pentecostal movement."

The full text of the printed letter, dated June 23 and addressed to the members of the First Baptist church at Albany, is as follows:

"The deacons of the church after prayerful consideration and with the concurrence of the pastor unite in the following statement and recommendation:

"In view of certain strange doctrines and practices we believe to be contrary to the faith and customs of Baptist churches and contrary to the teaching of the word of God, and perilous alike to the well being of the individual Christian and to the unity of the church as well, and

"In view of the solemn duty imposed upon us as deacons of the church to exercise faithful oversight of the spiritual interests of the church, we remind any who have forgotten and inform all who do not know that

"It is contrary to our belief as Baptists and contrary to the word of God to hold or teach that speaking in tongues or bodily sensations of any kind are the Bible test of the spirit-filled life. Such teaching, being contrary to the word of God, is divisive and harmful to the church and has never been an article of Baptist belief.

"It is contrary to our belief as Baptists and contrary to the teaching of the word of God to hold or teach that physical or bodily manifestations should be expected or sought in getting things from God for the believer walks by faith and not by sight.

"If there should be any member of our church who still prefers to believe and practice these things against which we have recorded this warning, we affectionately advise them in the name of our Master, to seek church affiliations elsewhere, where these doctrines and practices are accepted. No one ought to remain in a church where his teaching is contrary to its standards and his conduct disturbing to the peace and prosperity thereof.

"In this hour we summon every member of the church to stand shoulder to shoulder in faithful support of our church, its doctrines, its pastor and the great denomination of which we have the honor to be a part."

The letter is appended by the names of R. L. Burkhardt, T. J. Hiseley, O. H. Blume, Nels Olsen, R. B. McClain and J. C. Southworth, deacons, and Rev. B. P. Fellman, pastor.

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TEXTBOOK CENSORSHIP DISCUSSED BY TEACHERS

Some Historians Could Do Better Is Believed

MUZZY IS CRITICIZED

Dr. Schaefer Declares It Bad Taste to Refer to Grant's Administration as "Pitiable"

Nearly one hundred educators from all parts of Oregon are in attendance on the state educational conference which opened on the University of Oregon campus yesterday.

Among the school problems discussed was the effect of censorship on school textbooks.

"Those who favor close censorship of textbooks and teaching," said Dean Henry D. Sheldon, of the school of education, "make the mistake of believing that the students do not think outside the classroom. If books of reaction-type are given to the students and the teachers are directed just what to teach, the only effect will be to destroy the confidence of the students in the teaching. Then they are more likely than ever to go in for radical theories, and the school will lose its rightful influence."

After paying tribute to the military genius of General Grant, Dean Sheldon went on to deprecate the throwing of a history textbook out of the schools of some of the American cities because it had said that Grant was not a great statesman. "General Grant," the speaker said, "had an unfortunate capacity for choosing friends, and his administration as president marked the low water mark of federal statesmanship in this country."

Why Whitewash Statesmen? "What's the use of saying that he was a great statesman? Why daub over all our statesmen with a coat of whitewash? It is a rule of art that we must have both light and shade. You can't have all light if you want an interesting landscape."

On the same subject, Dr. Joseph Schaefer, former head of the history department on the campus and now secretary of the Wisconsin State Historical society, said: "If authors are compelled to make books suitable to all political parties, we are going to have a lot of spineless and inadequate historical works. More likely, however, the result will be a simpler, calmer, saner historical statement regarding historical events and particularly regarding men. If such is the result, the outcome will not be so bad."

Dr. Schaefer regarded it as unnecessarily bad taste for the historian, Muzzy, for instance, to refer to Grant's administration as "pitiable," and he hoped there would be greater skill in the use of language on the part of historians.

Social Development Discussed. The social development of the students through school government was discussed by Principal J. C. Nelson of Salem high school; F. A. Bauman of McMinnville high and Superintendent H. Omer Ben-Lebanon. Similar development through student activities was the topic discussed by City Superintendent Will E. Wiley of The Dalles and Principal Harry E. Johnson of Roseburg.

The educational conference will be opened today with the address on "Education and Effective Citizenship," by Superintendent W. J. Cooper of Fresno, Cal. The afternoon program in Guild hall, with Dr. H. D. Sheldon presiding, will include the following topics and speakers:

1 p. m. Securing public support for a school building program (illustrated). Superintendent E. E. Carleton of Eugene, and Superintendent E. A. Stanbrough of Newberg.

2 p. m. Round table: "Our best year." Superintendent H. W. Kirk, Oregon City; Superintendent Fred Brown, Baker; County Superintendent Pearl Hall, Lakeview; Principal A. C. Voelker, Holick; Superintendent O. D. Byers, Independence.
