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URGE COMES FROM HOME

DEMAND FOR EDUCATION IS FOUND AT FIRESIDE

President Campbell Tells Summer Students That Good May Come from Retrenchment

President Campbell of the University of Oregon, expects the cause of education to profit from the era of criticism resulting from the post-war agitation against high taxation, he told the assembly of summer session students in Villard hall yesterday morning.

Under these conditions, said the president, "we are under the necessity of taking account of our values. This may be a good thing. We educators sometimes get too sure of ourselves; too sure of our public. We are in a period of taking account, and we are going to have to face it. Some are wondering if we are going to make our advance again after this period of retrenchment. The reassuring fact making for the advance is, that the demand for education does not come from our educators. From our leaders, from our politicians, from our statesmen. The pressure comes from the fire side.

"Every subject crowded into the public schools comes as a demand from the home. We didn't force art into our public schools; the home did it. We didn't force economics, nor political science, nor sociology. The home did it. The pressure came from the home. We must take account of expense and the possibility of taxation; but the tremendous urge of the home means an educational come-back stronger than ever."

Explaining the economic pressure for education, President Campbell stressed the increased earning power conferred by education—\$600 a year average income for the man who stopped school in the sixth grade; \$1200 for the high school graduate, and \$1500 for the college graduate. Deeper than all this, however, he contended, was the old racial urge for self-expression. "You can't possibly stop education," he said. "The individual and the home are going to demand more and more opportunity."

The great objectives of education were listed by President Campbell as follows: Better physical health, since four-fifths of man's ills result from preventable ill-health; not the aloofness of the isolated individual, but knowledge; skill; appreciation and creation of things of beauty; democracy; and the Christian doctrine of good will. The cultivation of such an attitude he regarded as of the utmost importance, contending that if it were not for the hate involved, even Germany and France could get together around a council table and settle the differences that are keeping Europe in chaos.

HEAVY WEEK REPORTED AT EMPLOYMENT OFFICE

One of the heaviest weeks in some time was reported at the employment office today. Positions filled is made by Frank L.
