**JUNE NOT SO COLD AFTER ALL, RECORDS INDICATE**  
 Only One Degree Below Normal, Says Weather Man

**RAIN IS ABOVE AVERAGE**  
 Thirteen Days on Which Precipitation Occurred but Not Very Excessive

The weather during a greater part of June was somewhat disagreeable to the average resident on account of so many rainy days but for all that the mean temperature was only one degree below normal and the rain fall was only .23 above the average, according to Lee Goetschius, local weather observer for the government.

The reason it appeared there was so much rain is that the moisture was spread out over an unusually large number of days. The record shows that it rained on 13 days, whereas the rainfall in June usually occurs in heavier showers and not so frequent. Mr. Goetschius says the rainfall for June was 1.90 inches as compared with a normal for 17 years of 1.67 inches.

Owing to the humidity and cloudy weather with no evaporation and 13 days of rain the Willamette river for the month has remained 1.3 feet above normal for a period of six years.

The mean temperature for the month was 60.2 degrees. The maximum was 59 on the 29th and the minimum 59 on the 14th. There were only nine entirely clear days. Eight were partly clear and 13 were cloudy. There were no frosts, hail or sleet. There was a light thunderstorm on the 15th and the prevailing direction of the wind was from the northwest.

**CANNING DEMONSTRATED**

**COUNTRY SUNSHINE CLUB HOLDS MEETING**

Miss A. Bengson, Specialist for Glass Jar Company, Gives Very Interesting Talk

The Country Sunshine club held a special meeting Monday at the home of Miss Bengson, northeast of Eugene.

A very interesting and instructive program was carried out. Miss A. Bengson, who for eight years was county superintendent of schools of Renville county, Minn. (Renville county had the first county nurse in the United States), and who is now canning specialist for a glass jar company, gave a very interesting talk on canning equipment.

"Ninety per cent of the spoilage," Miss Bengson said, "is due to defective equipment." Defects in jars were pointed out, different brands of rubbers tested proving that color of jar or rubber is a matter of choice not of quality.

**Tells of Interesting Survey**

Miss Bengson told of a very interesting survey made while she was county school superintendent. Three communities of three different nationalities were included. The children handed in a record of the kind of food they ate for the three meals for a certain time, showing that it was essentially the same for the three communities and that a "balanced ration" was lacking. Milk, fruit and vegetables were not used as liberally as they should be. She became interested and in turn interested the parents in the hot lunch and the necessity of canning more fruits and vegetables.

**Miss Cowgill Demonstrates**

Miss Cowgill, assistant state club leader for girls, told of how canning was first done by the French and demonstrated the canning of peas through the various steps of bleaching, cold dipping, filling and sterilizing jars and rubbers, to the final processing in boiling water. Questions were asked by the members and answered by the demonstrator.

Miss Cowgill also told interestingly of the club work done in the state.

**SURVIVORS REACH LAND**

**EIGHT OF TREVESSA CREW DIE OF HARDSHIPS**

PORT LOUIS, Island of Mauritius, June 30.—The last drop of water had been drunk and the last biscuit eaten when the second life boat of the British steamer Trevesa arrived at this island yesterday with 16 survivors. Twenty-four men got away in this lifeboat from the Trevesa just before she sank a month ago in the Indian ocean. Eight of them succumbed to the hardships.

Chief Officer Smith told of the terrible sufferings the men went through. He said that the eight men who died began drinking sea water when they could no longer withstand their thirst. The last of them died in sight of land.

The daily ration was one biscuit for each man and a few drops of water. They added to the original meager water supply by catching rainwater. When they landed, the survivors, faint and some of them with long beards, sank to their knees and thanked God for their deliverance. All of them had badly swollen feet from constant immersion in salt water.
