DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2.—Both egg and butter markets showed a slowing up during the day, apparently due to lack of interest from California. The South has withdrawn from the market, at least temporarily.

While selling prices on eggs did not change, the top buying price for the day was down to 24c per dozen.

Poultry prices were unchanged, except for creamery eggs, which were up to 37¢ a dozen.

Tilamook and Coos cheese prices are steady, with prices unchanged, but a little firmness is shown in Eastern cheese, with a general price advance.

Black Swiss is very firm in the East. As there is plenty of local cheese, no price advance is expected here, simply out of sympathy with the Eastern market.

PLENTY OF CHINOOK SALMON
Chinook salmon is in better supply. Stock is very choice, and a few are of the highest quality. Plenty of frozen Silver-skin and Chinooks at much lower price than the fresh stock. No change in halibut prices. Stock on the Portland market is strictly fancy, being caught off the Oregon coast. Nothing better can be had anywhere. The razor clam season is now over. No more need be expected until the season opens on September 20. Shad and Olympia oyster seasons are also over.

MEAT RECEIPTS ARE LIGHT
Fortunately for the wholesalers, receipts in dressed meats were light. A record for the week was made by clean up at steady prices. Had the receipts been heavy the market might have fallen off as the market cannot afford to get stocked up before the holiday. Veal sold generally around 13¢ 13 1/2¢ per lb. and hogs for 11¢ 11 1/2¢.

POULTRY MOVES OUT WELL
Owing to the light receipts, poultry moved out well during the early trading at unchanged prices. Spring ducks, however, are a drag on the market, and several dealers would be glad to clean up their holdings at prices ranging as low as 18¢ per lb. No more spring ducks are needed on the Portland market at present.

WHOLESALE HOUSES MOVE
Front street was mourning the loss of two wholesale houses during the day—Ryan Fruit company and Bell & Co. Both houses moved to the East side over the week-end.

Butterfat—Portland delivery basis—No. 1 grade, 41¢ per lb.; No. 2, 38¢ per lb.; No. 1 extra, 38¢ 39¢ for "A" grade.

Eggs—Buying price, Front street (subject to grading)—Mixed color standards—Western Oregon, 24¢ per doz.; pullets, 20¢ 21¢ doz.; henneries, 25¢ 26¢ per doz. Selling price (storage pack)—extra, 31¢ doz.; select, 29¢ 30¢ per doz.; candied, 25¢ per doz.; pullets, 23¢ 24¢ per doz.
