It was first thought that the eye had been injured but it was found that a gash had been cut a fraction of an inch below it.

The train handles local passenger traffic between here and that city and the two overlands also leave here early in the morning are relieved of this work.

Takes Exception to Whitman Story—That the "Whitman Saved Oregon" story is a historical fabrication which all careful history students have abandoned 20 years ago, was the statement of Dr. Joseph Shafer of the University of Oregon yesterday. He averred that President Harding in his Meacham address had doubtless depended on others for his historical citations which he scored as more or less pleasant fiction but wholly untrue. Dr. Shafer, how-

ever, mentioned the fact that Mr. Harding had discussed the story's historical validity but took decided issue with the facts contained in the address.

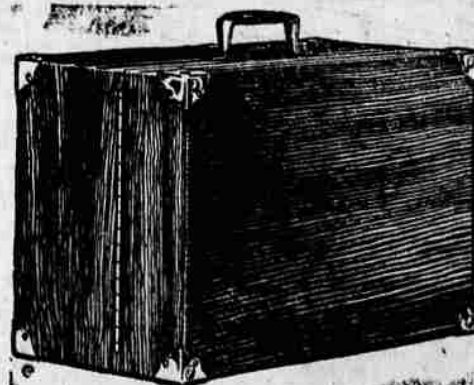
