RETAIL TRADE IS FAIR

BRADSTREET'S NOTES SEASON. ALL QUIET IN LINES

NEW YORK, July 6.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: "Quiet in part seasonal, and in part as the result of desire to adequately weigh up conditions as they present themselves at the time of the year, has overspread the trade and industrial situation this week. Retail trade, under the stimulus of holiday preparations, has been fair to good and the current pace of industry is still remarkably active, largely on old orders, while trade in primary lines has been on the quiet side, though fully active with, however, more caution displayed than in any other line.

"Collections still drag, but crop reports apparently indicate a holding of all the gains made in June and the preponderance of opinion favoring better outturn in the earlier planted crops than seemed possible a while ago. Sentiment as to the future seems mixed with, if anything, a preponderance of opinion among bankers and business men on the favorable side but with speculative interests inclined to take a less optimistic view of various matters.

MOBS COWED BY TROOPS

HAS HAD WHOLESOME EFFECT IN OKLAHOMA

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., July 6.—Sending of troops to Okmulgee county recently in connection with alleged numerous cases of mob violence there has had a wholesome effect on the courts in other places in the state, Governor J. C. Walton declared in an address today at the Dewey Roundup.

"I ordered troops to Okmulgee because of the frequency of reports of whippings and to make an example for the rest of the state," the governor said. "Other counties were just as much in need of troops as Okmulgee, but I want to tell you that since the Okmulgee affair, I find that courts are functioning better in other places. Not desiring to criticize the courts I am stating the truth when I say that they had fallen down numerous times in dealing with these mob cases."

PLANS RESCUE IN NORTH

NOICE TO RELIEVE STEFANSON PARTY ON ISLE

SEATTLE, July 6.—Harold Noice, who announced in Toronto, June 29, that he would take an expedition from Nome, Alaska, to relieve a party sent by Vilhjálmur Stefansson and on Wrangle Island since 1920, left here today on the steamer Victoria. The Victoria is bound for Nome and other far northern ports.

Mr. Noice said that he expected to charter a boat in Nome to go to Wrangle Island where Allen Crawford and four other members of the Stefansson party were related to have gone and a move to establish the British flag over the territory. The island is in the Arctic ocean north of Siberia.

DOLE OF LIQUOR TO AILING NOT LIMITED

Congress, Having Permitted Its Use, Cannot Dictate to Medicos, Court Rules

Dr. FREUND CASE DECIDED

Held For Issuing More Than 100 Permits In 90 Days

JURIST RULING GOES FAR

Holds That Portion of Federal Prohibition Enforcement Act Which Seeks to Restrict Number of Prescriptions Invalid

HELENA, Mont., July 6.—Congress once having said that alcohol can be used for medicinal purposes cannot now dictate to the physician as to the number of whiskey prescriptions he shall write or the quantity he shall prescribe, Federal Judge George M. Bourquin held today. In his decision Bourquin invalidated the prosecution of Dr. J. R. Freund, a Butte physician, who it was charged had issued more than 100 prescriptions within a 90-day period and prescribed more than one-half pint of alcohol to one patient in ten days.

The decision in substance held that Congress cannot substitute its judgment for that of the physician ruling similarly to Federal Judge Knox of New York who on May 9 last granted an order restraining prohibition authorities from interfering with the practice of Dr. Samuel W. Lambert with respect to the amount of whiskey which might be prescribed to one patient.

The ruling of the Montana federal jurist, goes further and holds that the portion of the federal prohibition enforcement act which seeks to limit the number of prescriptions is invalid as well as that portion limiting the quantity prescribed.

Held Arbitrary Restriction
The invalid section of the law with reference to the number of prescriptions is "arbitrary but not arbitrary in restriction upon the number of patients a physician shall treat in ordinary course of circumstances, or is an unreasonable mandate to malpractice in respect to them," read the court's decision.

Continuing the court said: "If therapeutics were an exact science and diseases and their courses of inevitable diagnosis and patients were all constituted alike" the prohibition arbitrarily fixing the amount of alcohol which could be prescribed might be valid, but since in respect to all these factors the truth is otherwise, every patient presenting to these physicians a different solution, this provision of the statute is invalid."

The court held that the bureau of internal revenue has the power to limit the number of prescriptions.

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ADAM, EVE SCULPTURES PRIZE OF ROCKEFELLER

GROUP TO BE ERECTED IN "GARDEN OF EDEN"

Site of Modern Paradise to be on Rockefeller Estate at Pocantico Hills, N. Y.

NEW YORK, July 6.—A gigantic group of Adam and Eve, each figure about 25 feet high and weighing 125 tons, designed and hewn from pure white Carrara marble by George Barnard, has been purchased by John D. Rockefeller and will be erected in a "Garden of Eden" on the Rockefeller estate at Pocantico Hills, N. Y., it was learned today.

The group, so posed that Eve seems to be rising out of a rib of Adam, will be placed in a marble arched background now being completed by Italian sculptors, on the Rockefeller estate, when Mr. Barnard returns from a month's vacation in Canada.

Two Barnard statues already stand near the site intended for Adam and Eve. One, "The Rising Woman," shows a woman reclining to a new strength, the other, "The Heaver," shows a nude man attempting to break a piece of timber with a primitive weapon.

The Adam and Eve group is one of the holdest conceptions of the subject ever shown, according to the New York Evening World, which asserted it took Mr. Rockefeller years to overcome a belief that the nude in art was demoralizing.

WHITFIELD TRANSFERRED

CONDEMNED MAN IS TAKEN BACK TO VANCOUVER

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 6.—George Whitfield, Clark county young man sentenced to death some time ago, and who has been in the Washington state penitentiary here since May, left today in charge of deputy sheriffs for Vancouver, where he will be lodged in jail pending the result of an appeal to the supreme court. Whitfield is reported as saying he preferred to stay in the penitentiary to being taken back to the Clark county jail.

His appeal will not probably be decided within the next six months officials state.

PIERCE APPOINTS BIGGS

In the fighting, a Turkish torpedo boat sank a Greek ship, according to the Constantinople report, and many were drowned.

The fighting took place Wednesday night but the report did not reach here until today. It said that the Greeks occupied the coast line and the battle ensued, many being killed and wounded on each side.

Finally the Greeks fled in panic to their boat which was fired upon by the torpedo boat Kemal Pasha, a large number of the Greeks going down with their vessel.

The Angora government, the report added, has telegraphed a protest to the near east conference at Lausanne. It is known here that the Turkish frontier has been closed for the last three days.

BREAK WITH GERMANY IS THREAT FROM ALLIES

ALTERNATIVE IS REPUDIATION OF RUHR CRIMES

France and Belgium Call Upon Cuno to Denounce Incidents Growing Out of Resistance

BRUSSELS, July 6.—The Belgian diplomatic agent at Berlin has informed the German government that diplomatic relations will be suspended if the reich does not repudiate unequivocally the Ruhr crimes. The French ambassador has given similar notice.

LONDON, July 6.—There is reason to believe, the Exchange Telegraph correspondent at Brussels says, that the French and Belgian governments have sent a communication to Chancellor Cuno of Germany demanding that he denounce the incidents growing out of German resistance in the Rhineland and the Ruhr in event of refusal by the Chancellor, the correspondent understands the Franco-Belgian representatives will leave Berlin.

BERLIN, July 6.—The Reichstag adjourned indefinitely tomorrow for the summer recess. It was authoritatively stated today.

Chancellor Cuno continued his conference today with Monseigneur Faell, papal nuncio. It was announced that a special courier had arrived from Rome bringing new instructions for the nuncio from the Vatican. The government's anticipated declaration on sabotage in the Ruhr is said to be merely a matter of form and the federal chairman is consulting with the Prussian government on the formulation of the statement.

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CROPS DAMAGED BY UNUSUAL RAINFALL

Patter in Oregon Sets Back Wheat, Hay and Fruits, Say Advisers Over State

STORM BREAKS RECORDS

Loss of Thousands of Dollars Faced By Growers

WASCO, SHERMAN SUFFER

Numerous Ranchers of These Counties Have Reported Fields of Wheat and Hay Beaten Down by Precipitation

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(Special to the Register.)—The last two days of heavy rainfall throughout Oregon has set back wheat, hay and fruit crops and threatens damage of thousands of dollars.

With a total of .76 of an inch of precipitation Wasco and Sherman counties faced a probable loss of thousands of dollars, in the wheat hay and fruit crops. Rain started falling at 5 o'clock last evening, continued steadily throughout the night and without break today, the hardest storm for the month of July in the memory of the oldest inhabitants and within about one-tenth of an inch of the record precipitation for the last three years, which was 5.4 inches recorded on January 7 of this year.

A general loss of at least five percent on the Wasco and Sherman counties' wheat crops was the minimum prediction of ranchers today and in some instances the loss to individuals was placed at as high as 10 and 15 percent. A loss of at least 10 percent in northern Sherman county seems certain, according to Curtis A. Tom, owner of the 200-acre North Star ranch in that district. Wheat fields in that vicinity were ready for harvesting, which would have started next Monday, the stands of grain were unusually heavy the year and the rain has caused the stalks of wheat to bend and lodge in such a manner that it will be virtually impossible to harvest them with ordinary machinery.

Hay, Grain Beaten Down
Numerous Wasco county wheat ranchers have reported fields trampled down by the rain. Park Bolton one of Wasco county's largest growers, said this afternoon that no estimate of the loss on his ranch could be made until the weather broke. If the rainfall stops and a light wind should spring up, part of the lodged grain would straighten, he said. Should wind develop and the rain continue, however, much of the grain yet standing would be blown and beaten down.

Thousands of tons of hay are standing in both Wasco and Sherman counties, which will be damaged to an extent as yet undetermined by the rain. Fortunately the cherry harvest is practically over in the Dalles district, although picking was still under way in several orchards. The cherry crop in the Dufur district may be seriously damaged, however, as picking was just starting here, it was said.

From Hood River, there was reported .98 of an inch, a record for July in the mid-Columbia. There was no indication of a let-up. The earth was wet to a depth of 12 inches. The precipitation while a boon to gardens and beneficial to apple and pear orchards, was expected to cause heavy damage to crops of unpicked Lambert cherries. Royal Annex were being harvested and practically all finished.

Send Reports Heavy Rainfall
Send reported that during the last 24 hours that section had been swept by one of the most unusual and inclement summer rain storms recorded in several years. Reports from ranchers and lookouts in the forest service indicated that the higher grounds were mantled with snow which were piled over the peaks. Three inches of snow fell on Paulina peak east of La Pine, and two inches of the December decoration now covers Walker mountain.

Since 1 o'clock Thursday evening up to 7 o'clock tonight 1.32 inches of rain fell in Bend. The temperature during the past 24 hours was abnormally low for this time of the year, the minimum temperature being 44 and the maximum today 59 degrees.

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PUBLIC IS BARRED FROM PARLEY ON SARRE SNARL

EVEN LORD CECIL ADMITS NEED FOR PRIVACY

Quiz Into Administration of the Valley Begun by League of Nations Council

(By the Associated Press)
GENEVA, July 6.—Even Lord Robert Cecil, a stalwart adversary of any form of secrecy concerning debates, recognized that discussions on the Sarre question begun by the league of nations council this morning, must be conducted without the presence of the public and might take a distinctly personal character on certain points.

Thus examination into the administration of the Sarre valley was started before a gathering of some 50 persons, all of whom are attached to the league. The members of the commission government of the Sarre were present in answer to a telegraphed request to attend. They are M. Rault, French president of the commission; Count Moltke Hulfeld, of Denmark, vice-president; M. Lambert, of Belgium; R. D. Waugh, of Canada, and M. Land, a native of the Sarre valley.

A colorful communique, issued at the end of the morning sitting says that M. Rault at Lord Robert Cecil's initiative, gave the council information on the commission's duty under the treaty; its composition and the manner of sharing the vote. The number and role of French troops in the Sarre, the development of the local gendarmerie and the circumstances under which were issued the March and May decrees, dealing with public order, security.

M. Rault informed the council that the commission had just granted amnesty to all those condemned under these two decrees.

LONG HAUL IS OPPOSED

IDAHO TO SUPPORT OREGON FIGHT FOR CHANGE

SALEM, Ore., July 6.—To eliminate the present necessity of shipping eastward to Salt Lake City in order to reach California points, Idaho interests are willing to support the Oregon public service commission in its fight to get railroad transportation across Central Oregon, according to correspondence received by the committee. A hearing on the matter is to be held in Portland before the interstate commerce commission on August 10th, the date having been changed from August 3.

The Idaho interests have been trying to get railway connection between Rogerson, Idaho, and Wells, Nevada, but this is a stretch of 200 miles across a desert country and is apparently impossible, though it would afford easy access to San Francisco. Since the Oregon plan would meet this need of Idaho, considerable support is expected from cities in the southern part of that state.

BACK TO CORSETS, EDICT

OFFICE GIRLS TOLD TO QUIT BOBBING, ROLLING HOSE

MUSKOGEE, Okla., July 6.—Office girls employed at the federal soldiers hospital here must go back to corsets, quit bobbing their hair, roll up their hose and adopt high neck dresses, according to the ultimatum laid down by Miss Alice Robertson, former congresswoman, now welfare chief at the institution.

"There has been too much laughing and talking down the halls with the patients," Miss Robertson declared. "Give the boys a run for their money; the girl a man admires is one whom he must fight for."

"Go back to corsets, girls, tend to business, wear decent clothes and don't try to hark back to the days of Adam and Eve."

Oil Well Still Aflame

PLANS TO SHOOT OFF FITTINGS ARE ABANDONED

CORSICANA, Texas, July 6.—The Mitchell-Jones-Seay-Cranfill Christian number 1 oil well tonight with blazed forth flames from three openings in the Christmas Tree connection and upwards.

Plans to bomb around the connection with a French .75 millimeter gun, operated by Texas national guardsmen, were abandoned today as being too hazardous. It was hoped the Christmas Tree might be shot off and the fire directed upward and away from other producers in the field.

Operators this evening had a new plan to use a giant excavator machine equipped with a huge crane, and to pull the fittings off the burning well.

The machine will be tried tomorrow. The fire broke out Monday.

FINDS BUSINESS IS GOOD

HEAD OF WOOLWORTH FIRM GIVES HIS VIEWS

NEW YORK, July 6.—"Retail business is good and I cannot see any reason why it should not continue to be good for the balance of 1923 at least," H. T. Parsons, president of the Woolworth company, declared today. "We do not hesitate to contract for merchandise for future delivery at present prices. I find merchandise prices on a stable basis and for that reason we are willing to buy ahead. We are not experiencing requests for financial help by the manufacturers turning out merchandise for us as was the case last year."

Mr. Parsons estimated that the Woolworth sales will reach \$185,000,000 this year, but added that there was no intention of paying any extra cash or stock dividends.
