RAIN STOPS STREET WORK

IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS HELD UP FOR FEW DAYS

Pavement on South Side of Fifth Avenue Will Be Completed in Short Time

The rain has put a stop to most of the public improvement work being carried on throughout the city, according to Harry E. Devereaux, city engineer in charge.

After the rain ceases and the ground is dry enough the work of laying the concrete pavement on the south side of Fifth avenue west between Blair boulevard and Polk street will be completed in two days, said the engineer. The work of paving between the rails of the O. E. tracks is practically completed. This will have to "set" for a month before work on the north side of the street can be started as the railway company has a temporary track there which it is using until the track in the middle of the street is ready to use.

The W. W. Road Construction company had laid 50 feet of concrete pavement on Midway street on Fairmount Heights when the rain came, and it is expected that this work will be completed in a few days.

Some of the forms for the curbing on Moss street have been set but it is impossible to do anything else there for some time, said the engineer. A short time ago an attempt was made to roll the street where it had been made ready for the pavement but no headway could be made on account of the moisture, even before this rain.

The eighteenth avenue and Lincoln street sewer has just been completed. University street from Eighteenth avenue to Twenty-second avenue grade ready for the pavement and the curbing forms on Sixth avenue east between High street and the alley just east of there are ready for the pouring of the concrete.

BIG INCREASE SHOWN

POSTOFFICE RECEIPTS AND BANK DEPOSITS GAIN

Postoffice receipts and bank deposits in Eugene during the past six months show a heavy increase over the same period last year according to figures announced yesterday.

The postoffice receipts from January 1 to July 1 were ten per cent greater than the corresponding period in 1922, said Postmaster D. E. Yoran, and the bank deposit increase has been 14 per cent. The total bank deposit at the time the report of the three institutions was made a few days ago amounted to \$4,403,255.19.
