But before completion the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific were severed by government order, the work stopped and the \$6,000,000 investment in the road to Crane has since been carried at a substantial loss on the company's books. Efforts were made when the unmerger controversy raged to draw President Carl Gray into a promise of construction in Central Oregon, but he was successful in evading the issues, pledging the line only to completion of the Natron cutoff.

But now that the issue has been settled to the entire satisfaction of the Union Pacific, it is being maintained by persons well advised in the matter that the Union Pacific is honor bound to further Oregon's interests by making the dirt fly in interior Oregon, a region once claimed as the Union Pacific's own field of operations but long neglected.

RAPS COURT ESPOUSAL

SENATOR KING DECLARES HARDING INSINCERE

HALT LAKE CITY, Utah, July 7.—Declaring President Harding "insincere" in advocating admission of the United States to the world court, and classing the administration conference called by the President as "a delusion and a snare," United States Senator William E. King, Democrat, of Utah, tonight launched an attack upon the Republican administration.

Speaking before the Young Men's Democratic club of Utah, the senator declared "the cards are stacked so far as the Republican nomination for president in 1924 is concerned and no power on earth can defeat Harding for the nomination."

"The policy of the Republican administration was one determined by the plutocratic forces of that party and not by the masses of the party," he continued. "President Harding has deceived the people by honeyed words and shrewd nationalism." The senator said. "He came to the senate and told us we must join the world court. I didn't believe him sincere but called him bluff and introduced a resolution calling for a vote on the treaty as they were presented by the court."

ONE DEAD IN RAIL WRECK

TWO OTHERS SUFFER BROKEN LEGS ON SANTA FE

LOS ANGELES, July 7.—One man was killed and two suffered broken legs in a wreck of a Santa Fe freight train at Lario, just east of Bartow, according to word received at the Santa Fe office here. Thirteen cars of the freight left the track, completely blocking the main line on the Arizona division, it was said.

R. S. Baugh, address unknown, was the man killed. The injured men were Gerald Culver Phillips, residence unknown, and James Jarvis, of San Pedro, Cal.

The dead man and the two injured were working on a second track at the time of the wreck. Baugh was pinned under one of the cars which left the track. The injured men were hit by flying steel, according to the report, not given in the report received by company officials.

From Lake Placid, N. Y., where Mrs. Hilliard is now resting after taking an insulin treatment for diabetes, reports were received confirming the separation which Mr. Hilliard said began last December.

JOHNSTON, IN BRILLIANT GAME, WINS NET CROWN

English King, Queen See Californian in Finals

WIMBLEDON, July 7.—Wm. M. Johnston of California, won the world's tennis championship on grass courts this afternoon in the presence of the king and queen and 26,000 other spectators, just as everyone believed he would.

But the superb fire with which his every move sparked as he defeated his compatriot, Francis T. Hunter, in straight sets, with a loss of only four games out of twenty-two, was more than any one expected.

Johnston handled the fierce forehand drives of the hard hitting New Yorker with all the ease, cunning and surety with which on previous days he had torn through the hind legs of weaker opponents. Striking a sizzling pace from the start he won the first set without the loss of a game, giving up only a driven point to Hunter.

In the second set Hunter got some of his hard smashing volleys and drove past Johnston and gained a lead of three games to two.

The Johnston-Hunter match was only one of four fought out today for world's championships. In the men's doubles the tried teammates of Great Britain, Randolph Lycett and L. A. Godfrey, triumphed over the Spaniards, Count De Gomar and Plaquar, 6-3, 6-4, 3-6, 6-2.

In the mixed doubles Lycett and Miss Elizabeth Ryan, another pair who have held the championship for years, disposed of L. S. D. Dean and Mrs. Sheppard-Barton in straight sets, but not without difficulty.

Women's Doubles Thrill

The most interesting contest in the entire fortnight came in the women's doubles with Suzanne Lenglen and Miss Elizabeth Ryan, court companions for many seasons, opposing the two bobbed haired girls who have great favor in the grandstands, the Misses Austin and Colyer. Of course the old timers won, but for a few minutes in each set they had a furious fight, a fight so lively and so daring on the part of the youngsters, or children, as the two girl players are variously referred to by the press and the public, that the crowd began cheering and howling like American baseball fans.

Miss Lenglen and Miss Ryan started with a rush that disconcerted the youngsters, who no doubt were a bit awed by the task of opposing such stars in front of such crowds, for it has been a short week since Miss Austin and Miss Colyer, both under twenty, were numbered among the unknown. Before the youngsters could get on their game—a dashing, jumping, smashing net game—Miss Lenglen and Miss Ryan led four-love; then they broke through Suzanne's service and the crowd went wild.

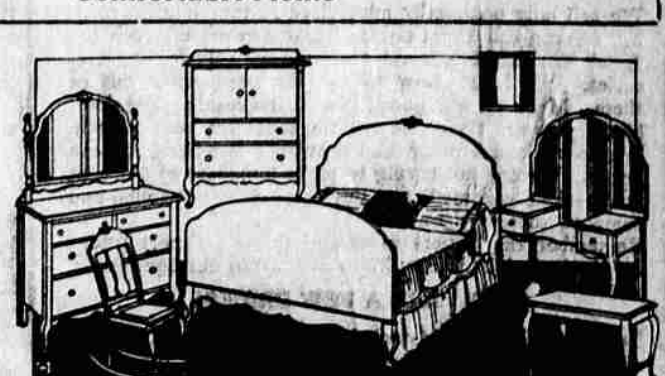
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FRANCE CHANGES POLICY
