HIGHWAY GAPS SOON TO BE HARD SURFACED

Section Between Albany and
Corvallis to Get Pavement

BRIDGE TO COME LATER

Span at Harrisburg Over Willamette
Cannot Be Built for
Two Years Yet

Eugene motorists will be interested to know that the state highway commission has announced that the Corvallis-Albany road, which is now used as a part of the Pacific highway will be paved next year beginning early in the spring. In the meantime grading will be completed, and gravel dumped in sufficient quantities to make travel safe through the winter months, it is announced.

Judge Malone, member of the state highway commission, who made the announcement said:

"We could start paving operations this fall except for the fact that there are about four fills to be left to settle during the wet months. Two of these are quite long, one of about a mile near Granger, and the other of a mile and a half directly this side of the bridge at Albany. Also, this fall we are not sure of federal aid, which has been assured for the spring. These two reasons made it imperative that we wait until spring, much as we would like to go ahead and finish the job as I know the people of Corvallis and Albany have been long suffering. We will dump about 120,000 worth of gravel on the new grade at once, making the road perfectly safe for all kinds of travel.

New Bridge Planned
"I might say in connection with the new bridge at Albany that this new structure will be located about three or four blocks down the river from the present old structure, thus interfering with across traffic while being built," said the commissioner. It will be a long bridge, with some form of opening or draw, yet to be decided upon."

Judge Malone says the highway will have an 18-foot width, with two-foot shoulders. Benton county's part in the Albany-Corvallis road project will be to grade the road and build the bridges. The state and federal government will do the rest. It is planned to build a concrete box bridge to take the place of the small wooden bridge near Albany, and the steel bridge about four miles from the town will be replaced by an up-to-date structure after the highway commission's own specifications.

To Finish West Side
The two-foot shoulders through Monmouth will be finished this fall, and pavement will be complete to Portland except for about a quarter of a mile near Monmouth, says the judge. Grading work between Albany and Harrisburg will also be completed this fall, and the east side Pacific highway will be ready for through travel with the exception of the one break at Harrisburg. There the new bridge will not be built for at least two years, says Judge Malone. In the meantime the state and county will keep the ferry in good condition.

LUCILLE SAUNDERS HERE

**FORMER STUDENT MAKES
NAME IN NEWSPAPER WORLD**
After Trip to South America, Noted
Writer Drives Across Conti-
nent from New York

Lucille Saunders McDonald, former student in the school of journalism at the university, has again come west, this time to stay, she states. Mrs. McDonald, who left the university in 1919, has just made the trip by motor from New York city, where she was employed on the New York World. She was accompanied on the jaunt out by her husband, H. D. McDonald, who has been attending medical school in the East.

A rough trip out, due to poor roads and a generous amount of rain, was reported, but Mrs. McDonald proudly claims that their car is the first one out from the East over the Canadian trail. She and her husband passed through here early yesterday morning, bound for Medford where they will visit for a few days.

Mrs. McDonald, who has the reputation of being one of the best newspaper women ever turned out of the university, has worked in nearly every section of this side of the globe since she left school in 1919. After working a few months at Marshfield and a short while at Bend, Oregon, she went to Salem, where she served as telegraph editor and reporter on the Salem Statesman. From here, in 1921, she went to Central America, and a little later arrived at Buenos Aires, where she became connected with the United Press. Mrs. McDonald later had charge of the filing of all news for South America, and this position she held with great success, until about two years ago, when she came to New York. Here she worked for the United Press, the Standard News Service, and later for the New York World.

Many special articles, written about her experiences, have appeared in newspapers all over the country, and the name of Lucille Saunders is known in newspaper circles from coast to coast. Mrs. McDonald expects to remain on the coast, and will probably work in Portland, she states. Mr. McDonald will re-enter the university here next year.

While in Eugene the couple visited with Mr. McDonald's brother, W. B. McDonald, who is connected with the Heilig theatre here.

LAST SURVIVOR OF BROOK
FARM COLONY TO SPEAK

Appears Twice Before Summer
School Students of Uvalde,
city of Oregon

Charles S. Woodbury, last survivor of the famous Brook Farm colony which included Ralph Waldo Emerson and others of the New England, or Concord, group of writers, will be on the University of Oregon campus next Wednesday and Thursday and will deliver two addresses, both of which will be open to the general public at Eugene as well as to summer session faculty and students.

On Wednesday evening at eight o'clock Dr. Woodbury will speak in alumni hall, woman's building, on "The Concord Group," and at the Thursday assembly hall, administration building, he will speak on Emerson. He was for several years private secretary to Emerson and is the last remaining one of the original sources of information about the great New England sage. He addressed several meetings on the campus two years ago, and his delicious humor is still remembered by university people who heard him.

At the Monday assembly Dr. Raymond H. Wheeler, professor of psychology, will give a presentation of "The Psychological Basis for Crime." Any interested in psychology, auto-suggestion or those are invited, in addition to

summer session students.

The Tuesday assembly will be devoted to the reading of a play, Sutro's "The Two Virtues," by Fergus Reddie, head of the department of drama on the campus. Wednesday morning, Professor Orin F. Stafford, head of the department of chemistry and discoverer of a new process for the distillation of the by-products of waste wood, will speak on the subject, "In the Field of Chemistry." The assembly hour each day is 11 o'clock and the place is the gymnasium. The interested public is welcomed.
