In a preliminary bout Nate Goldman, Philadelphia, outboxed Pinkey Mitchell of Milwaukee in eight fast rounds, according to the newspapermen. Both men scored knockdowns in the fourth round. Mitchell weighed 133 pounds and Goldman 140.
